Region seeking volunteers

The Region of York is looking for volunteers who are interested in children with special needs.

The volunteers will serve on a committee, one of four being set up in Ontario, as a pilot project, to plan, coordinate and monitor the delivery of services to children in the region.

"This has got to be a hard-working committee," said regional chairman Bob Forhan at a press conference last Wednesday.

The committee would be looking at the services provided by more than 50 agencies in York Region, including the Children's Aid Society, the Association for Children with Learning Disabilities, several group homes and many more.

It would be looking at the way that services provided by school attendance officers, probation officers, psychologists, and social workers may overlap or fall short of actually helping a child because of a lack of facilities.

The province is paying the whole cost of the project for three years. Mayor David Schiller noted the project was part of a much larger scheme that the province was going through.

That is a full-scale overhaul of the administration of services by the ministry of community and social services.

At present, each social agency applies for funds from the province individually and provincial administrators do not feel they can properly assess the needs of one project in a particular area compared with another.

Regional or county-wide committees to advise Queen's Park on spending priorities would be of assistance. Chairman Forhan hoped this would lead to some increased efficiency and economies in the children's services field.

Social services director Alan Wells said that the practice had been not to look at what was best for

the child but what part of the system he can put into.

Regional councillor Alma Walker said that every member of the regional health and social services committee except herself was enthused with the concept in children's services.

She suggested that the Children's Aid Society should be the most important agency in the field and that it should have a representative on the committee, if it had to be set up.

But she was opposed to getting involved in a field that "should be a provincial responsibility

in the first place." Those who have expressed fears of empire building have been assured that the budget at the start only allows for the salary of an executive secretary, clerical help and \$20,000 for consultants.

Mayor Schiller admitted there was a danger of committee members promoting the projects of their pet agencies, but thought the make-up of the committee would lessen the risk.

To fill the committee, the region needs 12 volunteers, only one of whom will necessarily be

a regional councillor.

The others will include a chairman appointed by regional council, a representative appointed by the local school boards, three persons directly providing services to children, one person directly providing health services to children, four lay persons not providing services to children but with special knowledge of children and interested in child advocacy, one person with direct expertise with developmentally handicapped children.

ABORTION AND FEDERAL ELECTION IN YORK NORTH

Members of Richmond Hill Right to Life have carefully and personally interviewed the three main candidates and one independent, in the forth-coming federal election, on the abortion issue.

1. BARNEY DANSON — LIBERAL CANDIDATE

Barney Danson in a position paper dated April 10, 1979, stated "Abortion must be a matter of individual conscience.... The type of legislation we have at the present time is, therefore, to my mind, a realistic position." This position permits and supports the killing of 60,000 unborn children a year.

2. JOHN GAMBLE — PROGRESSIVE CONSERVATIVE CANDIDATE

Mr. Gamble stated publicly and in personal interview on March 2, 1979, that he would not change the present legislation and he has publicly stated that he is in agreement with Mr. Danson, that is for "abortion on demand".

3. BRUCE SEARLE — NDP CANDIDATE

Mr. Searle, in a personal interview on February 28, 1979, stated that he accepts the party platform of the NDP that abortion is a private matter i.e. abortion on demand.

4. MR. KATZMAN — INDEPENDENT CANDIDATE

Neil Katzman, in a personal interview on May 10, 1979, stated that he is **TOTALLY PRO-LIFE AND BELIEVES THAT ABORTIONS SHOULD ONLY BE PERFORMED TO SAVE THE LIFE OF THE MOTHER.** He also stated that he believes in "preventive medicine" — that is education to prevent conception.

HOW SHALL I VOTE?

Several concerned conscientious persons, who do not wish to vote for a pro-abortion candidate, have asked us what to do. Perhaps there is no better answer than to quote from a recent magazine article:

"Many factors have to be weighed in making this choice. However, one thing is certain. I cannot in conscience vote for any candidate who favours or promotes or even passively and reluctantly tolerates attacks on human life at its source, attacks on human life before birth and attacks on life after birth, regardless of how good or bad the candidate's record might be otherwise. Human life is such a grave matter that an adverse stance in its regard is by itself sufficient reason for disqualifying a political candidate."

In closing, we would like to thank the thousands of pro-life supporters who signed the Campaign Life petition. After approaching the candidates with the petitions, not one of the pro-abortion candidates has modified his position.
