

Lots of soccer clubs

The Richmond Hill Soccer Club acquired its 39th sponsor at its May meeting thereby solving the problem of finding a team for surplus registrants.
It also created a problem of finding a few more players to ensure the 39th team has a full roster.
There will, in any case, be far more than 39 teams playing in and around The Hill this summer.
The club has agreed to accept nine teams of the Whitchurch-Stouffville Soccer Club and two teams from King City to play an interlocking schedule of games with house league teams of Richmond Hill.
The club will field two senior girls teams and one at each of the levels of Atom, Mosquito, Peewee and Bantam. It looked for while as if there might be two teams at the Mosquito level but unfortunately, the response from the girls aged 11 and 12 was not quite enough. Those who do not make

the squad will be given a chance to play on boys' teams.
Frank Briggs, chief coach of the RHSC, is busy matching up teams and coaches for the season.
Given the large numbers who attended the very successful pre-season coaches' clinics, his task, though difficult, should be an agreeable one and the level of competition this summer should be very high, especially if the participation of young players in the two weekend soccer schools is as great as anticipated.
Registration forms for soccer school should be returned to Frank as soon as possible. The first 30 will probably participate in the first session. Laggards will go the second week.
Now that the warm weather is here coaches and players have been streaming out of gymnasiums into the sweet smelling grasslands. Training is always more fun out of doors but

playing, which is still greater fun and does not start in earnest until the last week of May, the 28th to be exact, for Town teams and the first week in June for house league teams.
Players who have not yet bought new boots or who are belatedly discovering that the ones they wore all last season

are unsatisfactory may still be able to take advantage of a boot exchange to be held early in June provided someone can be found to organize it.
The soccer executive also plans to have team photographs taken early this year by the last week of June if that can be arranged.


