

Train station on slow track

At its May meeting the Richmond Hill Soccer Club took two important and related decisions. It became evident that the acquisition of the old

CN Station as a new permanent clubhouse for soccer in this area puts certain burdens on the club. While the Town of Richmond Hill will look after

the details of moving the station to a new site on Elgin Mills, the soccer club must pay the costs of the move. It is understood that CN would like to see the

station moved before the end of June. Whether or not the Town will be in a position to meet such a deadline, it is clear the soccer club cannot get any fund raising ac-

tivities going until after the end of June. Ideas for fund raising activities in July and August were discussed, among them a mammoth garage sale and a soccerathon but nothing will be done until the season is well underway.

Meanwhile, however, the club intends to pursue plans for self-incorporation. In addition a special subcommittee to deal exclusively with problems arising from acquisition of the station has been formed.

Chairing the subcommittee will be Ed Kenny, Jeff Walker will be looking after financial aspects of the move. They will be ably supported by Derek Smith and Tony Lott and will have the power to recruit any person who, in their view can aid in the matter.

YMCA Mini Marathon takes off on Sunday

Calling all Richmond Hill and area road runners.

The third annual York Region Family YMCA Mini-Marathon Challenge Cup hits the road Sunday at 9 a.m.

Starting gate will be the YMCA at 83 Dunlop Street in Richmond Hill with over 100 competitors, of all description, going through their paces.

The races get underway at 9 a.m., with the course weaving its way through Richmond Hill and region for a distance of 20 kilometres or 12.4 miles.

"Interest in the Y's Mini-Marathon has just boomed," states Y director Jim Ferguson. "We've already got 65 runners registered and more are indicating their interest so it should be an excellent turnout."

Ferguson credits the growing popularity of the annual race to the "fitness phenomena that everyone is grabbing

onto.

"General exercise and running has just skyrocketed," he said. "All you have to do is watch out your windows and see the runners going by of all ages and descriptions."

And that's the type of people the Y's Mini-Marathon Challenge Cup is designed for.

"This is for everyone," said Ferguson. "You can run or jog or walk at your own pace. The idea is to finish and we mark your time. This way you can have something to judge your next year's progress by."

The serious runners will also have their day with the likes of Fred Robbins of Richmond Hill and Kathy Tanner of Toronto competing.

Robbins holds the course record for early finishes with a time of 1:10:20 in 1977. Miss Tanner holds the women's record for last year with a time of

1:38:25.

The Challenge Cup will go to the school that completes the most kilometres. There will also be prizes for the fastest male and female in the Open race. There will also be categories for Masters and team competitors.

All runners will receive a participation Mini-Marathon stick-on crest and will be mailed a
