The second half saw Aurora putting on a lot of pressure but unable to get any goals.

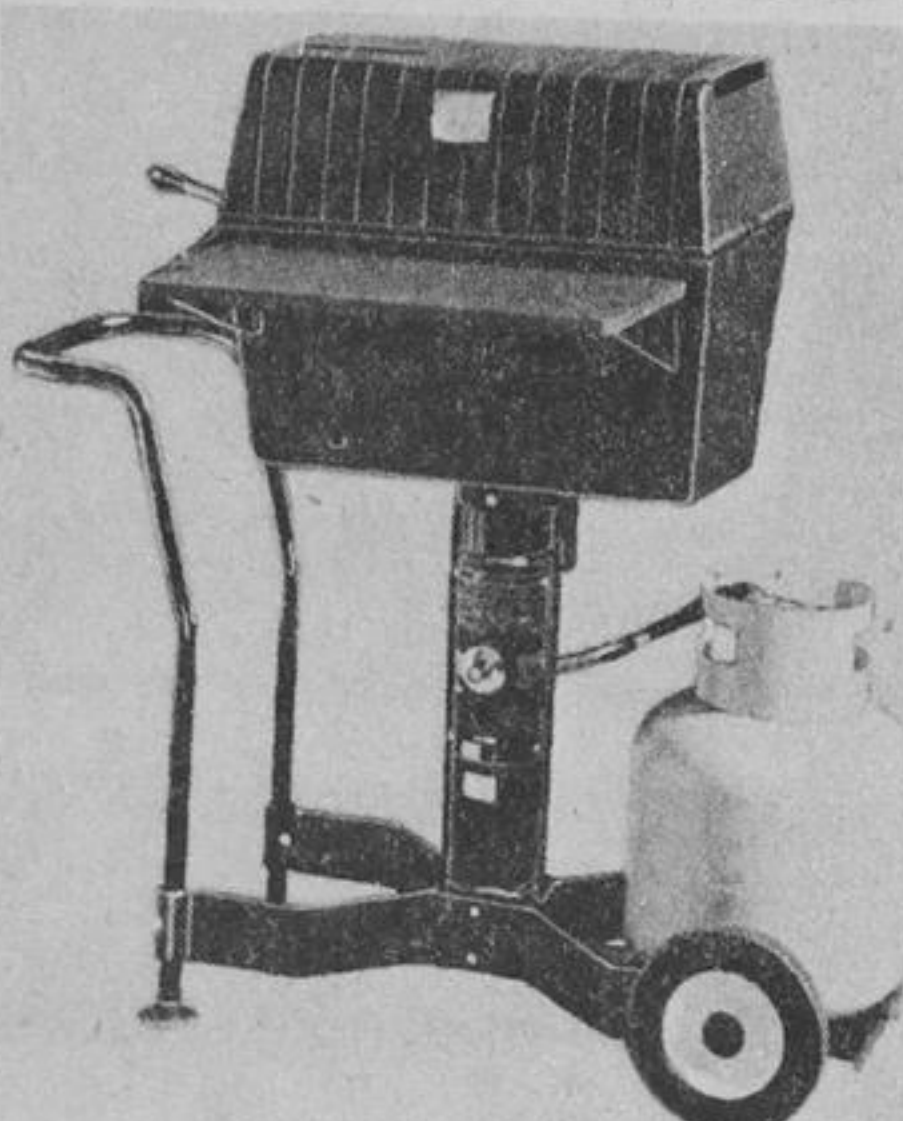
Richvale got a break very late in the game and Tim Whelan, hit the top corner of the net with a sizzling drive.
