As the religion editor of the Toronto Star wrote: "People are wooed not on the basis of any lasting principles but on the expediency of apparent short-term gains - which will ultimately prove to have been

The Church offers an alternative approach to government, for it is called to transcend the private interests of any one person or any one class.

The New Testament proclaims that God's love has exploded beyond national boundaries. The disciples of Christ are called to witness the love

of God all over the world. Jesus' story of the Samaritan who helped the Jew in need, even though the Samaritan and Jewish nations had poor foreign relations with each other, points out that to love our neighbor means much more than loving our fellow nationals. The Church therefore calls us to care for the world in concrete ways, even if

that entails personal sacrifices. We should think twice about building up the Canadian economy if that is going to mean erecting tariff barriers against developing nations and reducing foreign aid.


We should think twice about making Canada self-sufficient in energy if that is just a means to isolating Canada from the needs of the rest of the world and a means to continue using fuel rashly.

We should think twice about concentrating on Canadian issues if it means ignoring the starving, the victims of disasters, the refugees.


