# Having a deep corner lot can prove expensive

If a County Court appeal last week had been successful it could have cost Richmond Hill taxpayers or recipients of a local

improvement a total of \$84,000. The town policy on local improvements is to consider that recipients of the benefits of project should pay a portion and the costs are calculated on

"flankage" The town policy is to allow the first 150 feet of flankage exempt from assessment, but the property owner must pay excess footage.
