

Could you sponsor one of the boat people?

The search for sponsors for Vietnamese boat people has spread to Richmond Hill. Syd Girling is the volunteer in town in charge of organizing these sponsors. He said he would like to organize a group of people, to be affiliated with the body in Toronto called "Operation

Lifeline", which was organized by Howard Adelman, a professor of philosophy at York University. "Operation Lifeline" is trying to recruit people who would sponsor Malaysian or Vietnamese boat people to come to Canada. People must agree to provide a refugee family

with food, clothing, accommodation and pocket money for a period up to one year, said Mr. Girling. "As well as a moral commitment to help these people assimilate into Canadian cultural lifestyle," he added. Mr. Girling said he is looking for groups of at least five people who are

Canadian citizens, employed and willing to put up a certain amount — \$2,500 minimum (among the five), and who would be responsible for a family for a period up to one year. Organizations and church groups are encouraged to look into such a project. A group from St.

Mary's Anglican Church in Richmond Hill has been trying, on its own, to make arrangements to sponsor a Vietnamese family, since February, and are presently awaiting final approval from the Department of Immigration. Mr. Girling was responsible for organizing a meeting held

last night at Richmond Hill Arena, hoping to give interested citizens of the area information about sponsorship and government immigration policies. At press time information as to the outcome of this meeting was not available. Anyone interested in receiving more in-

formation can call Mr. Girling at 663-2599, or Steven Garrick at 883-4815 or 883-3959. A meeting is also scheduled to take place at Holy Trinity Church in Thornhill on July 17, with representatives from the immigration department as well as someone from the Vietnamese com-

munity available to answer questions. In Thornhill the people to get in touch with for more information are Andrew Meles, 889-9623,

or Dick Armstrong at 881-1395. Any families sponsored are above and beyond the government quota now at 12,000 people.
