Gamble will listen to woes

John Gamble wants to meet with ratepayer groups as soon as possible to see what position they want him to take with the CNR about the train problem in Thornhill.

Residents have been complaining about the noise of shunting trains and the possible dangers of explosive materials left sitting on sidings.

Mr. Gamble said he has met with officials of CNR, told them of the concerns of Thornhill

residents and listened to their explanation of the situation.

He said CNR told him there is at least one industry in Thornhill where rail cars are dropped off, making shunting necessary to join the cars for the completion of a run.

About the trains standing, CNR said the trains are often put on alternate lines to let other trains pass.

Except for these two circumstances, which Mr. Gamble

feels are acceptable, there is no reason for trains to be sitting or shunting on main lines in Thornhill.

After speaking with residents about their particular concerns, Mr. Gamble said he will attempt to get an "absolute commitment" from the CNR.

If not forthcoming the York-North federal representative said he will go to the cabinet with the problem.
