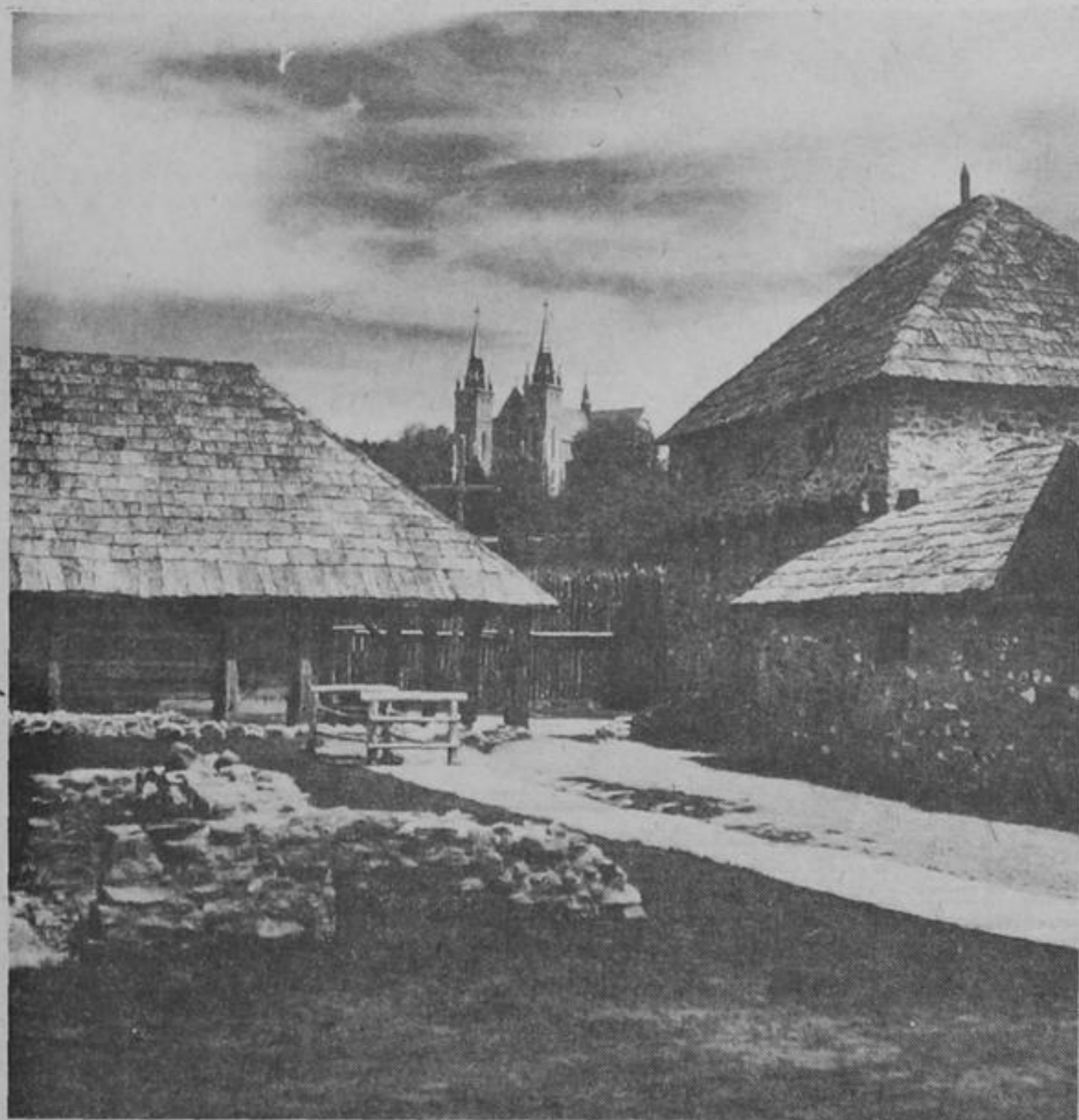

Sainte-Marie leaves you with magic

You come away from Sainte-Marie among the Hurons with a special feeling.

Some people call it magic.

Sainte-Marie is the cradle of christianity in Ontario — the home of the Jesuit missionaries who carried the cross to the Huron Indians 300 years ago.

Some of the enchantment is created by the talented young staff who tell the story of the Jesuits with verve and imagination.

A visit to the reconstructed mission in modern-day Midland is a religious experience, especially at dusk as the sun sets behind the towering wooden crosses.

You'll find that it's the spirit of the staffers that you'll remember after a visit. When it comes to enthusiasm they're hard to beat.

You'll meet a cobbler who puts on a convincing skit about the trouble he had getting Frenchmen to wear Indian moccasins.

Another young man with fiery black eyes that glow with fervor, talks about the tragic end of the Jesuits. His voice almost cracks as he points to the grave of Jean de Brebeuf who was killed in an Iroquois raid.

Maybe this young man in the black Jesuit robe goes out to discos after work but on the job he lives the life of a priest in the 17th century.

About 140,000 persons visit Sainte Marie each year. It's fun for children because they can pump the bellows in the forge, grind corn for bread in the cookhouse and give a hand with the saw trestle.

School groups who stay at the mission discover that it takes most of the day to prepare meals. In

winter, students are put to the test of snow-shoeing for seven miles, lighting a fire in the bush and brewing sumach tea. Surprisingly, the city kids fare better than their country peers.

It's not unusual for visitors to spend a couple of days exploring Midland and Penetanguishene.

Last week, more than 100 pupils were staying in The Sportsman Motor Inn on Victoria Harbor so they'd have enough time to digest what they saw.

They banged away at pinball machines in the motel games room at night but during the two-day stay, they visited Huron Indian village, the naval and military establishments, toured the Wye Marsh Wildlife Centre, the Martyrs' Shrine and the Huronia Museum.

Midland is also a popular spot with senior

citizen groups since there is much to see and do. Among places catering to visitors is the Highland Motel and Restaurant in Midland which prepares attractive, moderately-priced meals.

The Wye Marsh Wildlife Centre is one of the best bargains in the province.

It's free. Everything about it is free — even the canoe trips that you can reserve on the Wye Marsh.

The marsh was created to slow down the city-slicker and make him realize that man shares the world with birds, fish and other animals.

You can spring along a floating marsh boardwalk that takes you out to the high reeds. Once out there, you get a magnificent view of the twin-peaked Shrine in the distance. The Centre provides

children with high rubber boots and nets so they can poke around the marsh.

It's an ideal spot to look for migratory birds. There's something about it that makes you think of Humphrey Bogart and Katharine Hepburn cutting through the swamp in The African Queen movie.

It's also a great place to swap crocodile stories.

Do you know why 19th century sailors slept in hammocks even when they were ashore? Or why they transported sheet glass in barrels of molasses back then?

You'll find out by visiting the naval and military establishments in Penetanguishene this summer. These are first-rate tourist spots, staffed by imaginative young people. Maybe it's the fresh air, but tourism seems to work well here.
