Friends and smiles in Bavaria

MUNICH, Germany —

Bavarians are different. You'll realize it immediately when you step out of your jet and into the luggage hall of Munich airport — they're less rigid than their cousins to the north, full of the kind of bonhomie you associate with a beer-drinking bout, full of pride about their magnificent city and wonderfully friendly.

Featuring a zest for life, a love of culture, and a history that stretches back through centuries of good taste, Bavaria has enormous charm to captivate the first-time visitor and ensure that he comes back again.

Some Germans call Munich the "clandestine German capital," others the "uncanny German capital," and it's true that

there's a certain rivalry between the easy-going Munichers and the industrial north. Bavarians are different from almost any other people in Europe.

After Munich was battered to bits in the Second World War, the city fathers didn't decide to change the whole character of the ancient city by building modern skyscrapers.

Instead, they rebuilt as much of the city as possible to match what had stood there in the decades between its founding 800 years ago and the time of its razing.

Old archways, buildings, bridges and walls grew again from the rubble, with now only a slight line of wind-weathered difference to German what was — and what now is — the new-old Munich.

It's a city of festivals, from the staid opera to the effervescent Spring Carnival; from the gentle resting places in the open air market to the magnificent sports complex built for the 1972 Olympic Games.

Visitors can ride in the park, look at the multitude of blossoms in the massive English garden, see the animals in the Munich zoo, climb mountains in the Isar Valley or stroll along the no-traffic shopping street to the Marienplatz, where ancient wooden horsemen mark the hours on the cathedral clock.

Munich almost has to be the start and the end of your trip to Bavarian delights. It means a switch in planes at Frankfurt, but the city has such vitality that even a night in the air from Toronto or Montreal is quickly forgotten.

Bavarian style, Munich has accommodation for every purse. First-class hotels (at first-class prices but with first-class service), medium-priced hotels (also with first-class service), small hotels that are almost always well-appointed and with a staff anxious to please, and bed and breakfast homes that include abundant hospitality in their small accounts.

You can get information listings about them all through the German National Tourist Office, 47 Fundy, Place Bonaventure, Montreal, Que. H5A 1B8.

Munich is the hub of so much in Bavaria that it's difficult to shift yourself out of the city and into a train or country bus to sample the high Alps, the sprawling small villages and special attractions like Oberammergau.

Dealing first with Oberammergau, now is the time to book for next year's Passion Play. It only happens every decade and reservations often follow a performance for 10 years hence.

Cosmos of London, a British tour company with offices in Mississauga, is offering tours out of London, England, starting May 19 and running through to Sept. 26, 1980. Accommodation and all meals are in private homes and a free local bus service takes tour members to and from the play.

Rooms are described as simple and clean, some with hot and cold water. Three categories of superior rooms in private homes or pensions are available at a supplement of \$18 to \$29 per person wishing to have hot and cold water in the rooms, private bath or shower.

The seven Passion Play tours range from seven to

19 days and are from \$429 to \$899 (ex-London). One is a tour of Austria, another of Italy, a third, Vienna and the Blue Danube. A fourth includes the Rhine, Black Forest and Switzerland, and the remaining three tours swing through Europe.

Except for the stay in private homes in Oberammergau, accommodations are in good tourist-class hotels and almost all meals are included. A brochure on the trips is available from Cosmos of London, 2759 Thamesgate Drive, Mississauga (phone 677-8690).

Lufthansa German Airlines and Canadian Travel Abroad offers 19-day tours that begin with an overnight flight to Frankfurt and thence by coach to Rüsselsheim for an overnight stay.

There are plans for a sightseeing tour of Mainz and then on to Nurnberg and the Romantic Road to Munich. After two days in Munich, tourists will go to Oberammergau for the Passion Play performances.

Then it's over the Austrian border to

Salzburg, Zell am See, Innsbruck, Liechtenstein, Switzerland and Heidelberg.

The tours include hotel accommodation, all meals at Oberammergau and continental breakfasts and dinners elsewhere, as well as surface travel by motorcoach. There are eight departures between May and September and the price is \$1,309 plus applicable airfare.

But if you don't want to wait for Oberammergau's famous play, there's the equally famous Oktoberfest in Munich.

Lufthansa, again in cooperation with Canadian Travel Abroad, has a two-week trip departing Toronto on Sept. 13.

The flight meets with a coach at Frankfurt and does a mini-Europe trip (including Oberammergau, but not for the plays) including four days in Munich.

The tour is \$855 and includes hotel accommodation, some breakfasts and all dinners outside of Munich. The airfare must be added to the land costs.

Plan now for winter holiday

New this year is a performing arts cruise (Peter Duchin and his orchestra will be aboard the S.S. Veracruz), a trans-Panama cruise, and tennis coaching packages with John Newcombe as the instructor, or a week or two at a Texas dude ranch. Get details from your travel agent.

VIA's Canrail pass, providing unlimited train travel, is now offered to Canadians as well as tourists from overseas.

One of these allows travel anywhere in Canada for either 22 or 30 days at \$240 and \$280. Another gives unlimited travel in eastern or

western Canada for 15 or 22 days, \$180 and \$225. The Corridor pass allows travel between Windsor, Ontario and Quebec City for eight or 15 days at \$100 or \$130.

VIA still has openings on its Sept. 23 departure for Grand Manan Island. Designed for bird-watchers, naturalists, beach-combers and hikers, the week long trip starts at \$310 per person and includes accommodations, charter bus, ferry charges and the majority of meals.

Scandinavian Airlines (SAS) has introduced a business class service on routes serving Canada from Nov. 1 for full-fare passengers flying economy class.

Designed for business people, the service will be located just behind first class and include complimentary cocktails and improved beverages, meal service, free head-phones and lounge slippers.

Recipes

Canadian corn is good, plentiful

Although it's hardly as high as an elephant's eye because of the dry summer season we've had this year, corn is still growing merrily to provide us with the enjoyable taste that is as Canadian as the long winter ahead.

Those sweet yellow nubbins that cling to the cob need to be fresh. Perhaps your best bet is to buy them directly from the farmer at one of the wayside vegetable stalls that dot the countryside outside of suburbia, although there are some who say that because they are left on display in the sun (perhaps all day) they're no better than those professionally picked and kept cool in the stores.

If you do buy from a wayside stall, buy only cobs that haven't been exposed to light by early husking. When the niblets are enclosed in the green sheaves in which they originally grew they'll be much better.

When corn cannot be used immediately after picking, keep it unhusked in the refrigerator. Warm temperatures begin immediately to turn the sugar to starch.

Some cannot enjoy such luxurious choice, in which case, return some of the sugar by adding it to the cooking water. Some milk added to the water helps, too.

The basic way to cook

corn on the cob is to place the husked cobs into a large saucepan and cover with warm water. Add one tablespoon sugar. When the water boils, wait 30 seconds, then turn off the heat and let the corn cook no more than two minutes. Remove and serve with salt and melted butter. Another method is to put the husked corn in a big steamer and steam over boiling water for 15 minutes.

Should you want to roast unhusked corn, turn back the husks, remove the silk, butter the corn, then close the husks and tie the ends with string. Put the ears in the oven half an inch apart and roast 30 minutes at 350 degrees F (177 C). Never salt the corn before it is cooked.

CORNCAKES

2 cups raw corn, scored and cut from ears
1 tbsp. fresh onion juice
1 tbsp. melted butter
one-third cup whipping cream
salt and pepper
3 eggs
butter for frying

Score the kernels with a sharp pointed knife, then cut them from the ears. Separate the eggs and beat the egg whites until stiff. Mix all the ingredients (apart from the butter), folding in the egg whites. Drop the batter from a spoon onto a well-buttered griddle and brown delicately on both sides. Makes six to eight cakes.
