

Soccer Mosquitoes in finals

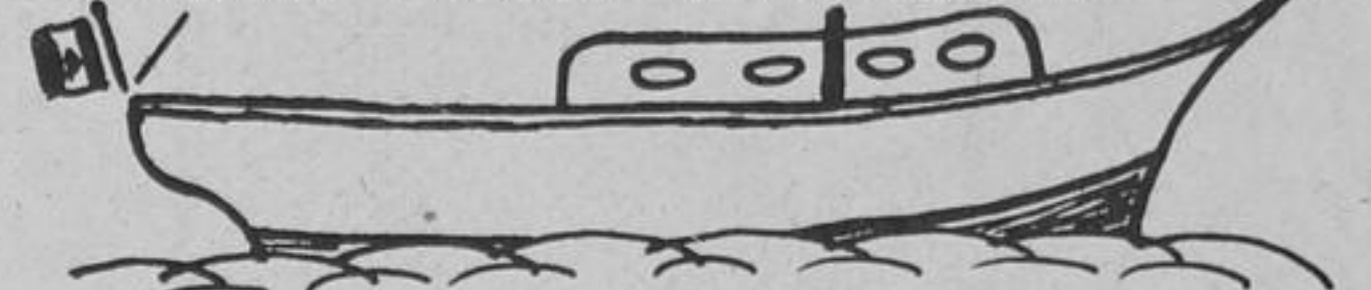
