Stephenson tastes stock car life

Ever since he was a child, 22-year-old Bill Stephenson has wanted to race stock cars. "They used to take me to see my dad race," said Bill, "and since then I've always wanted to race." Bill's father, former councillor and well known business man in town, Dave Stephenson, raced stock cars at Pinecrest, the CNE and Ottawa for about seven years, Bill said. This is Bill's first season and he spent it racing at Sunset Speedway near Barrie. "I didn't do anything spectacular this season," he said. "I was just learning how to drive." The most exciting night was his first (and only) win, said Bill, describing

how he had a fellow driver right on his tail "all the way", and how he almost "spun out" on the last lap. Last week Bill drove his first race on the bigger and faster track at Cayuga Speedway. For this race the Richmond Hill resident had a new stock car, his second, this time a blue 1976 Camaro with a specially prepared 350 CC Chevy racing engine, Ed Howe chassis and quick-change rear end, a stock-car with which he is very pleased. Bill was happy with the outcome of the race at Cayuga. He just missed qualifying by one car — he was number 31 out of 30. Although he's always wanted to race, Bill admitted he always had the

idea stock-car racers were a "tough breed of guys". "But, I've really been impressed", he said, describing the help he has received from different drivers. He mentioned the hints and techniques he received from another stock car driver, Terrence Tommy Milligan, also of Richmond Hill. Bill also talked of the help he has received from his pit crew, Steve and Jack Slaughter, Harry Woodward, and his Little Brother, Jamie. Jamie was at every race, said Bill, and is a valuable part of his pit crew. In his spare time, when he's not racing or working on his car, Bill is a Big Brother and a volunteer

leader with Young Life. Some will remember Bill from the seven years he played hockey with the Richmond Hill Rams. Professionally he is involved in the construction end of the shopping centre field for W.A. Stephenson Construction. The stock car season has finished for this year and already Bill and his crew are planning changes to the car to make it faster for next year. Bill said he is looking forward to getting his dad out to drive in a race next year. "He's been just itching to get in the car all season," he said.

Two charged

A Woodbridge resident was one of two men arrested last week and charged with conspiracy to commit murder in connection with the lead-pipe beating of John Meiorin, Pine Valley Drive, Woodbridge, last March. Metro and York Regional police Saturday arrested the Woodbridge man, and a resident from North York. They are also charged with conspiracy to commit assault causing bodily harm.

The arrests followed six months of investigation by four York Regional detectives and members of the Metro police intelligence squad. In March, Meiorin, 52, secretary-treasurer of the

Bricklayers and Masons Independent Union of Canada, was beaten unconscious in front of his Woodbridge home by two men who fabricated a way to use his telephone the previous day. He spent several days in hospital recovering. He said the same two men who beat him were at his house asking to use the phone because their car broke down.

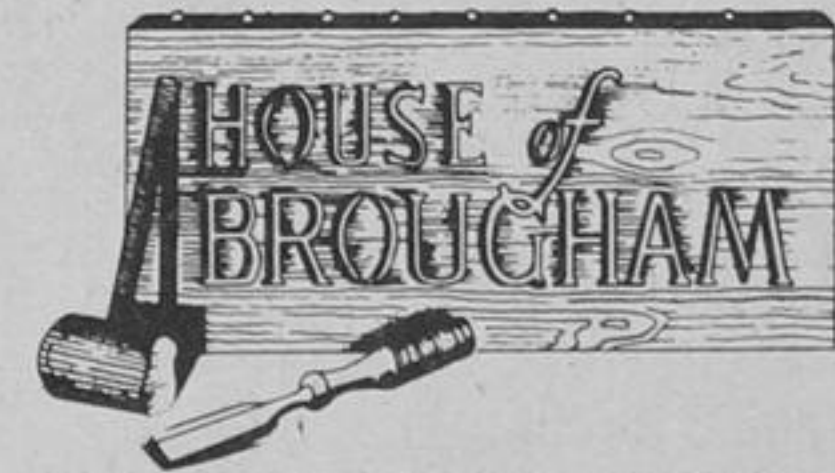

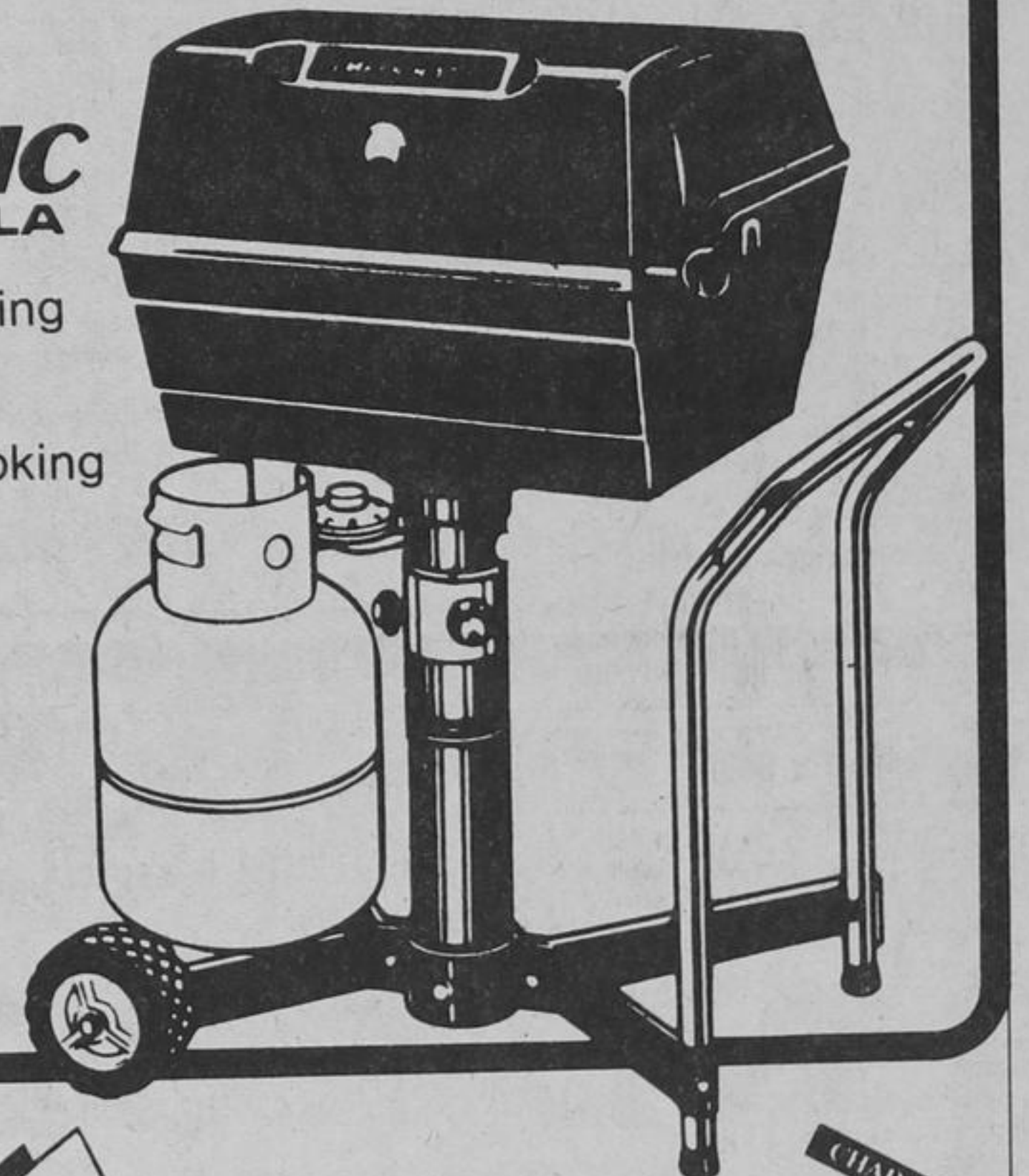
