On Saturday, September 28, the finals in all house league games will be played at Crosby. 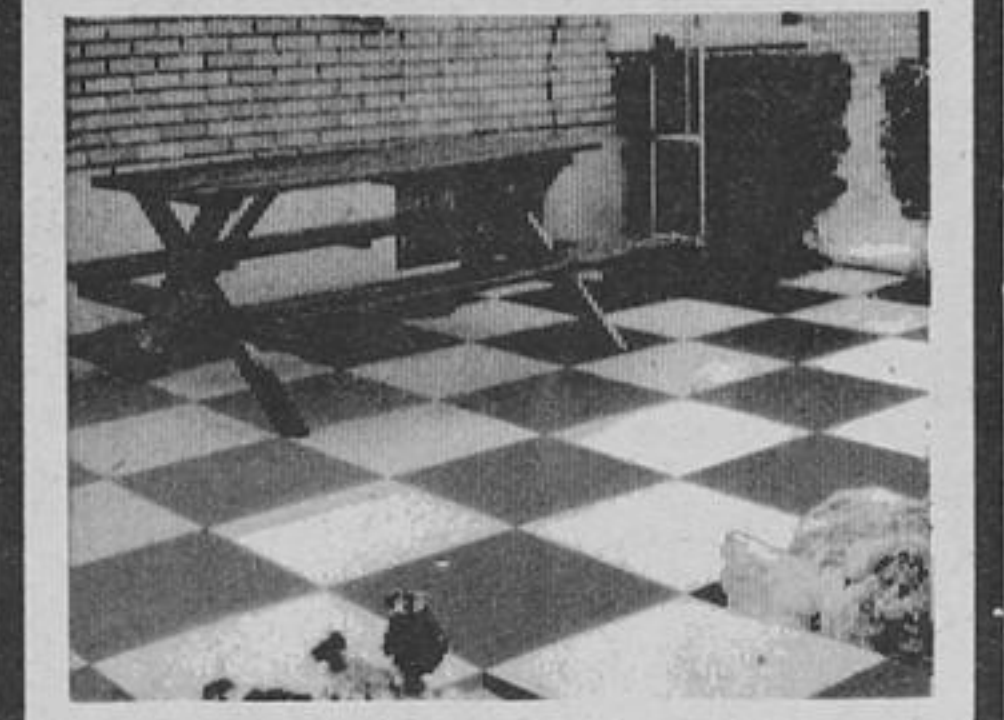

The subject lands are presently designated Industrial (General) by the Secondary Plan, which permits development for industrial purposes.

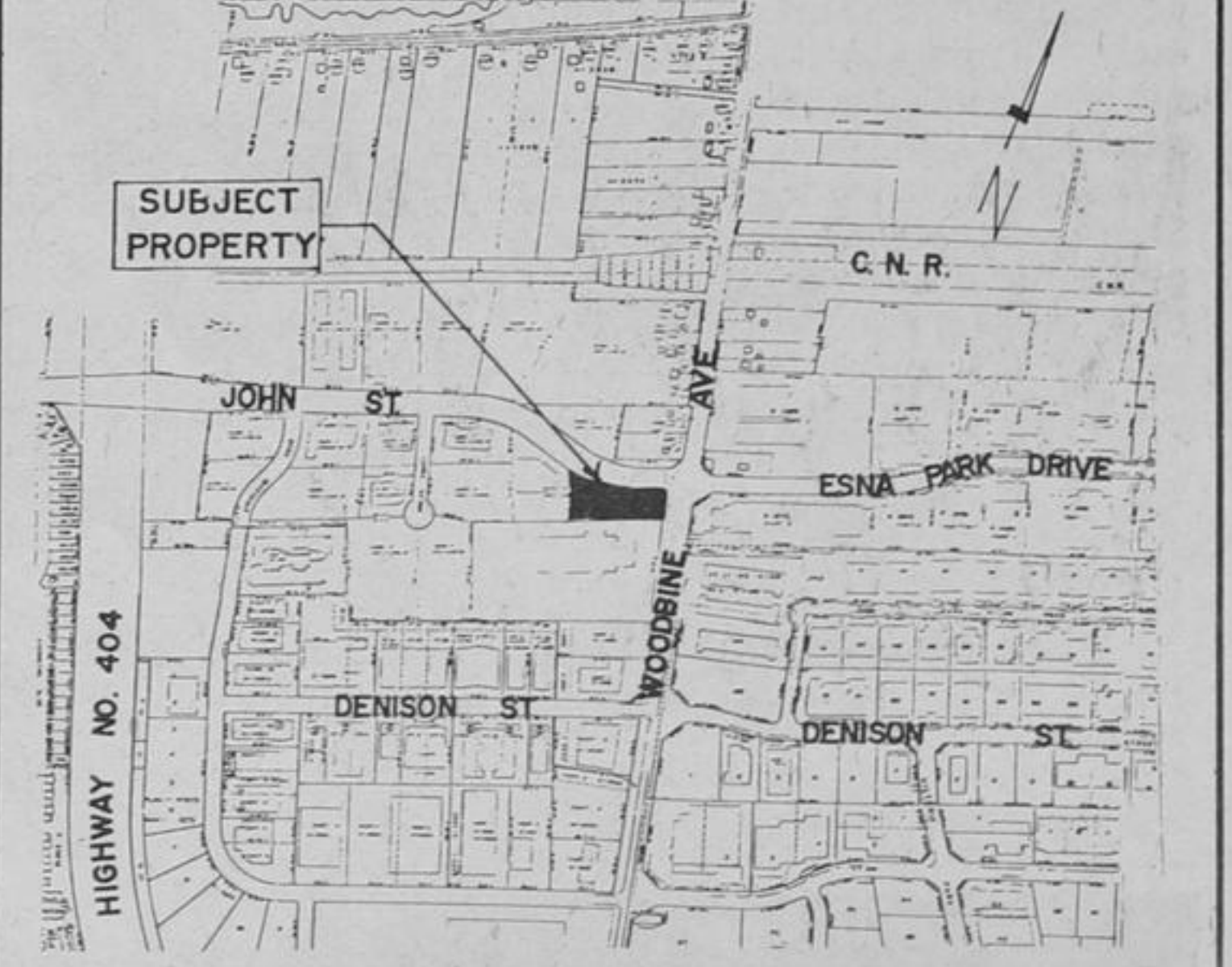
The purpose of this amendment is to permit the development of a restaurant on the subject lands.
