Principals' conference

High school and elementary public school principals from across York Region will take part in a special three day conference later this week in Orillia.

The conference, organized by the York board of education and the principals, is expected to attract about 100 people. Board trustees will also take part.

The three-day meeting is meant to give principals a chance to air problems, and discuss their interests and needs.

Most of the seminars and workshops for the conference have been planned by principals themselves.

The conference, with the theme "We are the system: Perceptions of decision making," will examine 16 different topics of interest to principals.

Among the subjects to be discussed are special education, bridging the gap between elementary and secondary schools, staffing and school organization, French in the elementary schools, the principal and the law

and future directions in education.

Most of the workshops have been planned by principals who will take part in the conference at Fern Resort.

According to Dr. David Disney, superintendent of human resources, the conference will "take a look at realities of what's going on in education in general and in our own sphere in particular."

Sharpshooter falters

Twenty-one year old George Leary of Gormley had the men's world trap shooting championship in his grasp on the weekend at Montecatini, Italy, but the bubble burst.

Leary shared first place after Friday's round with three-time world champion Michael Carrega of France but wilted under pressure in the final round.

He was able to break only 19 of 25 last-day targets and finished in 16th place with a total score of 187. Tournament-wise Carrega went on to win his fourth world title with a score of 194 of a possible 200.

Leary fell out of medal contention with his disastrous shooting and slipped one placing below Canadian teammate Marcel Dubois of Rosetown, Sask. Dubois

finished with the same total — 187 — as Leary, but took 15th place because of fewer misses on the final day.

Leary, who missed getting into the medals by finishing fourth at the two previous world championships, couldn't explain his sudden crumbling under pressure,

especially his six misses in the morning round. "Usually when I can see a bird, I break it," said the young veteran shooter. "I saw every one

this morning, so I don't know what went wrong.

"But I'll kill them in Moscow," he added, alluding to the 1980 Olympic Games.

SECONDARY PLAN AREA

A Public Hearing will be held by the Planning Committee of the Council of the Town of Markham to consider a Secondary Plan for Part of the Markham and Unionville Planning District (Planning District No. 1).

The subject community is commonly known as Raymerville.

The subject lands are located between McCowan Road on the west and Highway 48 on the east, and between 16th Avenue on the north and C.N.R. (Uxbridge Subdivision) on the south. The lands consist of approximately 238 hectares (588 acres) and are designated Urban Residential, Open Space, Hazard Land and Industrial in the approved Official Plan of the Markham Planning Area.

The purpose of the Secondary Plan is to establish detailed land use categories being Urban Residential (Low Density), Hazard Lands, Open Space and Industrial and to establish a basic pattern of internal streets, location of schools, parks and associated community uses for the future development of the area.

The Urban Residential (Low Density) designation will permit single family detached dwellings, semi-detached dwellings and single attached dwellings such as street townhouses or linkhouses.

Actual development of the lands will in addition require the prior approval of plans of subdivision and appropriate zoning by-laws and agreements.

You are invited to attend the Hearing and to state your support of or objection to the proposed Secondary Plan. Should you be unable to attend, written submissions will be received up to the time of the Hearing.

The proposed Secondary Plan, the Official Plan and existing land use maps may be examined at the office of the Planning Department. DATED October 11, 1979.
