Recycling depot seeks new home

Four sites are being looked at as possible homes for Richmond Hill Recycling depot, burned out September 22.

Two existing buildings, the Mills Greenhouse Garage on Pugsley Avenue and the Spruce Street Firehall, are being considered.

Mills Greenhouse garage building is partially demolished

and would require extensive repairs as well as a confirmation by the owners the site will be available for three years; while the Spruce Street Firehall is presently used to store seasonal parks and public works equipment as well as provide storage for two local groups.

The advantage of the firehall is the municipality's cost would be limited to heat, light and water.

Another expensive alternative would be to lease space in the Newkirk Road area at \$2.20 per square foot. About 4,000 square feet is required, by the committee.

In a report from Bill Rice, Commissioner of Finance, the idea of using funds from the insurance settlement, together with funds required for either the greenhouse garage or the firehall

to replace the building in such a way it could be used in the future by the Agricultural Society on the parks site.

These suggestions as well as any others that come up will be looked at by a special committee made up of Councillors Al Duffy, and Dave Barrow, the Commissioner of Finance and members of the recycling committee.
