FRAUD ARREST

As a result of a four-month investigation by Police, a man was arrested at the home of his brother in Thornhill and charged with 20 counts of fraud amounting to nearly a quarter of a million dollars.

The accused, of no fixed address convinced many people to invest money into explorations of Uranium in Ontario and Quebec from 1975 to

Substantial profits were to be paid to the victims, but all they got was numerous NSF cheques from the accused.

Collectively, his victims lost in excess of \$200,000.

The accused was scheduled to appear in Newmarket Court October 29.

THEFTS

There have been a series of thefts from the Glenshields subdivision at Dufferin Street and Steeles Avenue, where the homes are still under construction.




