Vietnam to Canada: a very tough ordeal

The price of gold is skyrocketing these days and many are aware of its value.

To Tuget Hao and Boi Chi Tang, Richmond Hill's first Vietnamese refugee family, gold had a very special meaning - freedom.

The price for the young family to join 370 others aboard a small boat bound for Malaysia, was 16 ounces of

Tuget, who speaks English haltingly, told The Liberal the story of five difficult years of saving to accumulate the gold which could be bought illicitly in South Vietnam.

Once the correct amount had been amassed the Tangs and their threeyear old son, Chi Hung, left South Vietnam heading for Malaysia. usually a two day trip.

Tuget, who prefers to be called Wai, said there was not even enough room on the boat for food or water.

The second day out to sea, the boat was attacked by Thai pirates who took all jewelry, rings and valuables from the frightened refugees

Five days later, lost at sea, a Thai fishing boat offered assistance in the way of fresh drinking water and fish to eat. This same boat guided them into Malaysia, where they were turned away by a Malaysian police

The second attempt, a total of seven days at sea later, they were allowed to beach the boat.

Wai said that while on the beach they ate leaves and fish until the Red Cross found them and took them to a Malaysian refugee camp with 8,000 others.

Huts described as being about ten feet by fifteen feet kept the hot sun off, but in rain Wai'said they just had to hunch down, the huts were just roofs on poles, without walls.

She said they were well fed in the camp with three meals a day canned sardines and peas.

The family of three lived five months under these conditions befoe a delegation came to choose families who would be sent to Canada, United States, Australia or Switzerland.

The Liberal interview was conducted the day after Richmond Hill's first snowfall and when asked of differences between the two countries, Wai laughed, remarking emphatically, "We not know snow"

She said the people they had met so far in Canada were more friendly than the people in Vietnam "They really welcome us," she

Only here one and one-half weeks, the family find the food quite dif-

In Vietnam the government sold

flour and barley, "cheap", but other commodities, even rice, were expensive.

Poor people seldom eat meat, she said, as even a chicken costs almost one month's wages.

The Vietnamese family eat both with chopsticks and a fork.

When asked to compare homes in Vietnam and Canada, Wai said only rich people in Vietnam have homes like she had seen in Canada. She said her family was "not rich and not poor'

She and her husband had originally carried on a machine shop business from their home in South Vietnam, employing about eight people, but under communist rule had been forced to work on a farm in the war zone which "wouldn't grow anything"

Three-year old Chi Hung was looking through a Simpson's Christmas catalogue with great glee during the interview, and Wai pointed out there were no toys like that for children in Vietnam.

Boi Chi, Wai's husband, who prefers to be called Kai, is happy to be working in this country said Wai, and they are both very grateful for the accommodation and clothing. Last Wednesday they began English classes and Wai is pleased to report on her husband's progress.
