The vote was something like 40 for the optional draft and only 28 for the common draft. Democracy will out. That, however, is strictly a personal feeling.

EXPANSION

It was also decided to allow expansion to eight teams from six teams next year if registration warranted it. The games would continue to be played at the Town Park Sundays starting at an earlier time.
