Bayview soccer teams are champs

It could be called the year Bayview Secondary School put its best foot forward in soccer. At least it'll do until a Georgian Bay championship comes along. The Don McNair-coached Bayview Midgets could do just that after winning the York County championship last Monday by blanking Aurora 4-0 setting up a Georgian Bay final today (Wednesday) against Bradford at Bayview.

Bayview had yet another York County championship earlier in the week as Cliff Nuttall's senior team downed Thornlea 6-2 to win the honors there. Unfortunately, Bayview went on to lose the Georgian Bay 3-0 to St. Andrew's College in a mud bowl last Friday at Bayview. "It's the first time we've won two out of three York County championships in soccer," enthused Nuttall. "We decided to

put a drive on this year to improve our soccer image and it worked out pretty well." He'll get no argument from McNair whose team went undefeated in York County play this season tying twice. "We got off to a slow start against Aurora," commented McNair. "They were all over us for the first 20 minutes. Then we scored the first goal and they just

wilted." Leading the Bayview onslaught was Tony Stewart with three goals with Gavin Harvey getting the other one. The midgets had faced their sternest test earlier in the week in the York County semi-finals against a tough Thornlea Thors squad beating them on the sixth penalty kick. It was a 1-1 tie after regulation

time and remained that way through two 10-minute overtimes before the final shootout on penalty kicks. Bayview and Thornlea exchanged goals until Ian Walker got the final one and Thornlea missed to win the contest. "Thornlea finished down in the standings," said McNair, "but we've had trouble with them all

season. We tied 0-0 on the first go." Nuttall's team won the York title in impressive fashion thumping Thornlea with Ed McNally showing the way with five of the six goals. N. Murphy got the other one. Then came the St. Andrew's loss which saw, according to Nuttall, "playing conditions that were the pits. It rained all

through the game." Despite the loss, Bayview threatened several times and missed some seemingly sure-fire goals. "St. Andrew's only had three shots on our net and they scored on all three of them. It was that type of game," said Nuttall. All in all a great year for soccer at Bayview.

What it really means is changes with Artemchuk convinced he's "a high-scoring rightwinger and a centreman away from what I'm convinced could be a championship team. We just have to fill in a few gaps."

In the meanwhile it was all gloomsville when, as Artemchuk put it, "we found ourselves trailing Georgetown 5-0 as soon as the National Anthem stopped

playing." Goalgetters in the game for Oak Ridges were Gino Cavallini, Brian Risk and Andre Damonzie.

The scene was even more frustrating against Brampton as the locals went into the third period leading 6-3 and proceeded to give up four unanswered goals.

"What really burned me," Artemchuk said "was four of the goals against us resulted from

losing the faceoff draw in our own end. That's why we need a good right-handed centreman."

Brampton's Rob Campbell, Steve Shirriff and Randy Hunt killed the Ridges team with two goals apiece.

Robin Searle got two goals for Oak Ridges with singles to Brian Risk, Mark Roberts, Rick Potter and Bruce Wilton.

The one point against Barrie

was an equal disappointment with the Ridges team leading 4-3 with one minute to go.

"It was purely and simply a letdown on our part that cost us the goal," said Artemchuk. "We just got burned again."

Oak Ridges is in Dixie Sunday for a 1 p.m. game and is at home next Monday night at Bond Lake Arena against Oakville. Game time is 8 p.m.

'Birds lose 3-2

The honeymoon, if there ever was such an animal, is over for the Thornhill Tudor Glen Thunderbird Junior B's.

It ended with last Sunday's 3-2 loss to Orillia Travelways when the Birds fired 38 shots at the opposition's netminder with the aforementioned results.

"When you fire that many shots and only get two goals it simply comes under the heading of bad shooting," said Coach Al Morris.

"And we've been doing it consistently. In the last three games we've been averaging 43 shots a game and have only come up with something like three goals. We can't go on like that." They won't.

CHANGES "We're going to make some changes," continued Morris. "We've got to go out and look for some shooters. The changes should come within the week."

Morris maintains that there isn't "a goalie in this league who's that good you have to fire 14 shots in a row at him to score a goal." The coach has already made one move defensively releasing spare goaltender Steve Lorenwicz. "We expect to replace him shortly," he said.

In the meanwhile, first-string netminder Dan Harley has been performing up to Morris' satisfactions. The team just hasn't been scoring for him. Sunday's game was a perfect example. The Birds outshot Orillia 20-7 in the opening period but could only

come out with a 2-1 lead on goals by Mark Wiltshire and Bill Chappell.

They turned out to be the only goals they got in the game as Orillia's Tim Laine tied the game in the second period and Ray Flaherty won it in the third with his second counter of the evening.

The Birds were outshot over those two periods 19-18.

INJURIES Morris has also run into the injury bugaboo with John Thompson and Steve Sampson out with shoulder injuries. Also out, but for a different reason, is

Jamie Kennedy who is serving a two-game suspension for an earlier ruckus against Dynes.

Thornhill's record now stands at five wins and eight losses which sees them in 10th place.

That's why Morris is rather alarmed at their firepower or lack of it. Their top shooter is Paul Howson with eight goals, 13 assists.

The Birds are in Barrie tomorrow (Thursday) and are at home Sunday to Milton for a 7 p.m. game at the Community Centre.
