Third in 13 months

Another brief goes to Dr. Stephenson

A delegation from the York Region Roman Catholic Separate School Board met with Dr. Bette Stephenson, Minister of Education, last Tuesday and presented its third brief in 13 months.

The Separate School Board demanded an answer within 10 days to its requests, and by Friday, should know one way or the other if more money is forthcoming from the province.

The first brief from the Separate School Board was presented in October 1978 in conjunction with five other boards from growth areas. So far, there has been no

response to this brief. Again in June, the Separate School Board presented another brief, this time asking for approval for schools in Pine Valley, Glen Shields, Milliken Mills and Sacred Heart Junior High School in Newmarket.

The allocation given for the addition to Our Lady of Good Counsel for 1982 was discussed and the urgency of moving the allocation to 1980 was also mentioned.

The only positive response to this brief was approval for the school in Milliken Mills providing it be made the number 1 priority.

But there has been no response about the other schools and parents, trustees and municipal officials are becoming angry.

The overcrowding in schools in these areas is becoming critical and the parents and trustees want action soon.

Delegations of angry parents are appearing at board meetings demanding action from the trustees, who in turn must approach the Ministry. That prompted the board to present the third brief.

Enrolment predictions given in the brief in June

have surpassed expectations and give every indication of continuing to sky rocket.

The major growth areas in the region are Markham, Vaughan, Thornhill and Newmarket and some schools are taxed beyond the limit. ... John XXIII-227 percent; St. Luke's-167 percent; St. Michael's-149 percent; and there are others with more than 100 percent enrolment.

Delegations to the board have accused the Ministry and the Separate School Board of poor planning, insensitivity to overcrowding, and long transportation routes.

They have accused the Ministry and the board of not caring, but the board, in its third brief, assures the Ministry that it does indeed care.

The board has just approved the new core concept for its proposed schools in Milliken Mills, Pine Valley and Glen Shields and hopes this may help the Ministry to approve funding more quickly, since the Ministry is in favor of cores for the new schools. With the enrolment at Our Lady of Good Counsel

allocation for St. Francis of Assisi in Pine Valley, Our Lady of the Rosary in Glen Shields (both new schools), an addition to Our Lady of Good Counsel in Sharon and approval of funding for construction to begin in 1982 for Sacred Heart Junior High School in Newmarket.

Chairman of the board, Larry Pelliccione said, "We have been promised an answer by Friday, and if the Ministry tells us there simply is no more money right now, we aren't giving up. We are going to keep on fighting for what we want and what we urgently need."

Fire gets house on second attempt

Strange as it may seem, the same house caught fire twice last weekend. But it won't catch fire any more.

At 11:30 p.m. last Friday, Richmond Hill Fire Department responded to a house fire on Leslie Street about a quarter of a mile south of the Gormley Sideroad.

They managed to save the structure, but flames caused about \$8,000 damage to the building and another \$2,000 to contents.

Firefighters were on the scene for three hours. Occupants of the house, Frederick and Roseann

Allen and a child, were not home at the time.

The second alarm at the same house was received about 8:30 p.m. last Sunday and firefighters arrived to find the house engulfed in flames.

They were unable to save the structure.

Damages are now estimated at \$30,000 for the building and another \$15,000 for the contents.

Arson is suspected in the second fire and the Office of the Fire Marshal is investigating.

The property is owned by Lloyd Perryman, 12 Cantedet Parkway, who rented it to the Allens.
