Public meeting for Bayview residents

A public meeting will be set up as soon as possible to give residents on Bayview Avenue, north of Elgin Mills Road, another look at an industrial proposal.

Hesse Rimon, the planning consultant for Beamish Construction Company, has asked the town to look at an application to change the split zoning on a property located at the north end of Edward Street, just north of Elgin Mills Road.

The parcel, owned by Beamish Construction, is divided by zoning, two-thirds residential and one-third industrial, in the existing official plan.

Mr. Rimon proposes "class A industrial, with

no open storage", for the 23 and one-half acre property fronting on the CNR tracks.

All municipal services are already available for a development, pointed out Mr. Rimon, giving the town industrial assessment at no extra cost.

Mr. Rimon also assured the council his client would erect a "meaningful" buffer of trees and a berm to protect residents to the east.

The Planning staff was asked to make a report on the application and a public meeting is to be set up to let residents look at the Beamish proposal and consider their concerns.

Risebrough school to follow core concept construction

The new public school in the Risebrough subdivision will be built under the core concept method, the York County Board of Education decided last week.

Most trustees were concerned about the size of the actual core, which is a central structure of bricks and mortar housing gymnasium, library, science, art and music rooms and several classrooms plus administration and maintenance rooms.

Washrooms and health and guidance centres are also included in the core, as is the Kindergarten.

To this core are attached several modular units, which are classrooms.

When the entire school is completed, it is difficult to see where the core ends and the modules begin.

Markham trustee, John Myers expressed concern about the alternatives presented to the board for approval.

The first alternative offered a core with one Kindergarten, six

classrooms, special subject rooms found in a core and allowed for four modules.

The pupil places in this plan would be 530, and the total expected cost would be a shade over \$2 million.

Other alternatives all offered variations on this theme, with additions to bring the capacity to 705 or 745 and all cost much more than the allocated \$2 million.

The Board understands that the \$2 million is the maximum allowed for this school, but wants confirmation in writing from the Ministry of Education.

Mr. Myers is concerned about only one Kindergarten being included in the Risebrough school and was able to show population predictions for 1980 and 1981 where the number of Kindergarten aged children would triple.

After much discussion, members of the board decided to convert one of the allocated classrooms to a Kindergarten if the

need should arise. Speed in making the final decision is important since the Ministry of Education allocated the \$2 million for Risebrough, only on the condition that it be nearing completion by the end of 1980.

Trustee Myers insists that the first alternative, which is the plan allowing a capacity of 530 simply is not large enough for the projected population in that area, but he was

assured that that's what the core concept is all about.

If the population increases and the school is threatened with overcrowding, more modules can be added to take the overflow.

The board approved construction as a core concept, and architects, are now preparing plans, and if all goes well, construction should begin early in the new year.

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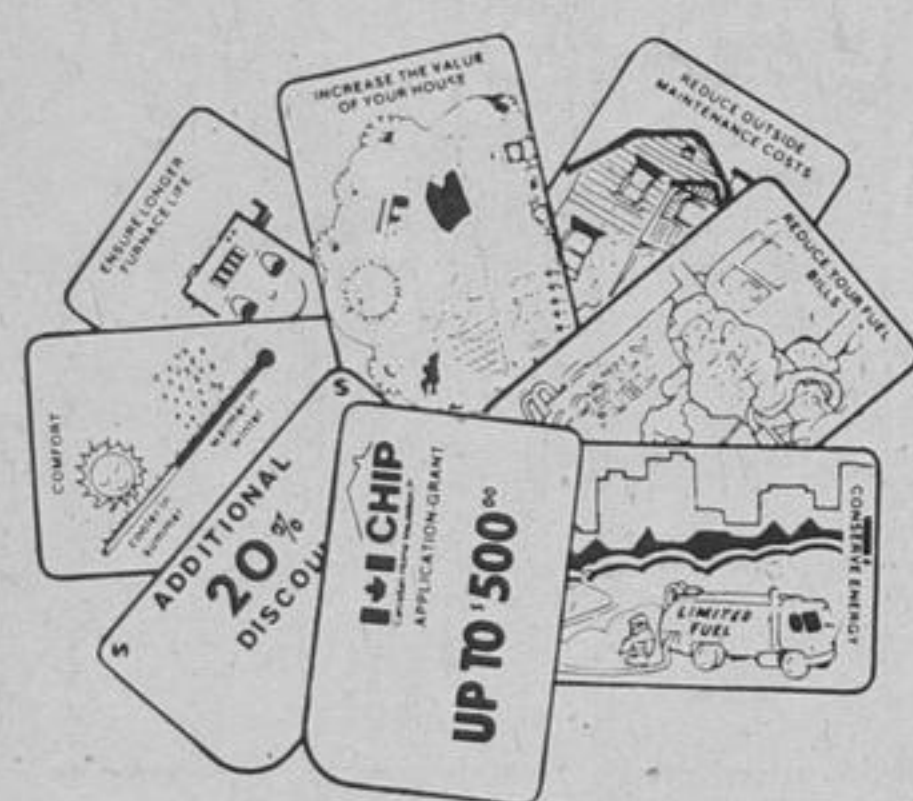

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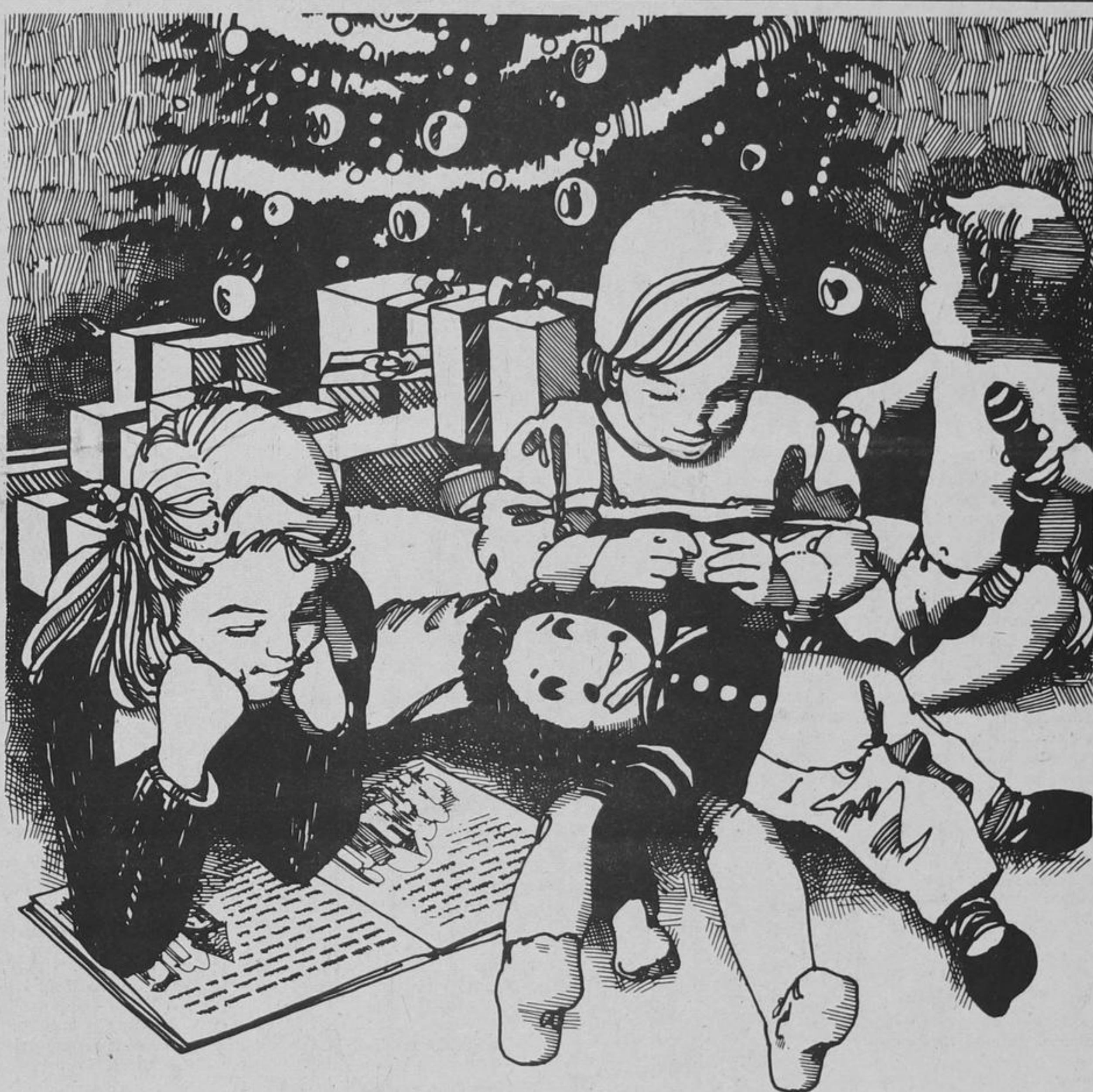

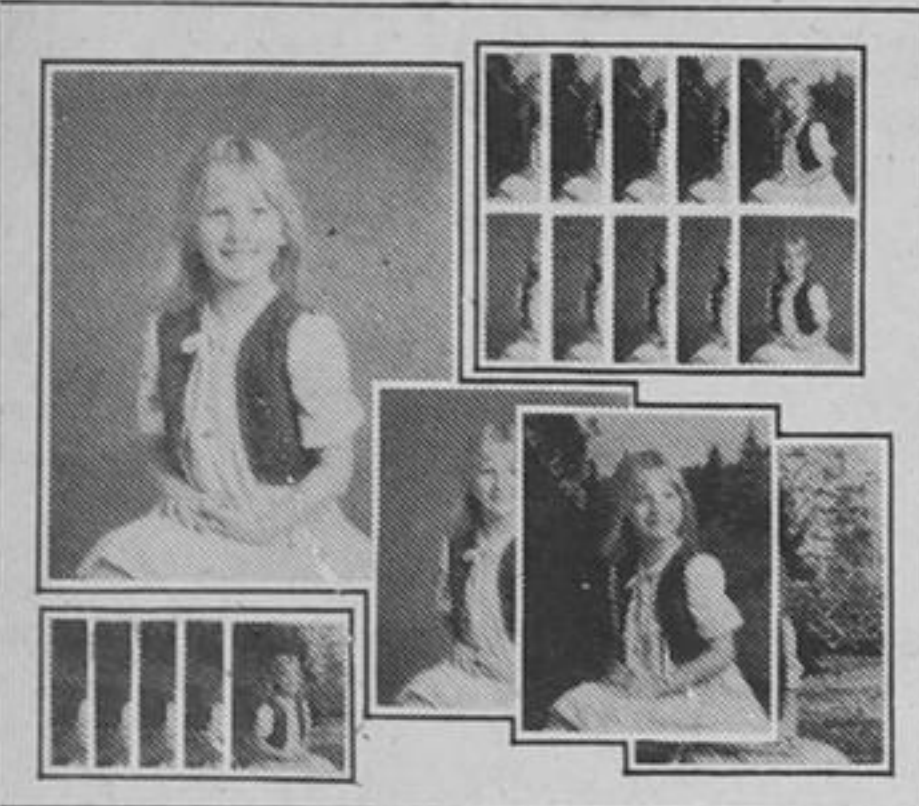
