# Yet another hearing for Spring Mills Estates

The ball is back in the Ontario Municipal Board's (OMB) park concerning the future of a proposed subdivision on Bayview Avenue, south of the Gormley-Stouffville Sideroad, to be developed by Spring Mills Estates Limited.

Friday a hearing was held in council chambers almost one year after the OMB handed down a decision not to approve a similar subdivision proposed by

Spring Mills Estates. Both the Town of Richmond Hill and the Region of York had changed their positions on the proposed development since that hearing and informed the OMB they no longer opposed the application to develop these lands as estate residential.

The original concerns of those opposed to the 105-acre subdivision included such technical concerns as the agricultural capabilites of the land, the availability of adequate water supply, the ability of the land to be appropriately serviced, the need for alternate access to Bayview Avenue, and the question of whether the lands were in the Oak Ridges Moraine. . tests were carried out.
