

## Hot Tubs soak your cares away

This time of year, when you are trying to gather yourself together after the holiday season, relaxing in a Hot Tub might just be the answer to your problems.

The Japanese have enjoyed communal bathing for centuries, as

did the Romans and Greeks, but the idea is relatively new to Canada. Hot Tubs, North American tradition, are wooden tubs, constructed of one-inch thick wooden staves, put together in a tongue and

tight tub, and sized anywhere from four to eight feet in diameter and four feet deep.

They are fitted with benches, jet sprays and bubblers. Water is kept at about 110 degrees fahrenheit to give the benefits of both a sauna and

whirlpool. The idea of Hot Tubbing is for one or more people to sit, immersed to the neck, and be massaged in the swirling hot water.

Hot Tub parties are becoming the IN thing to do and Hot Tubbing is described as a family activity.

Thornhill resident, Mollie Rothman, saw an ad in an Orillia paper advertising the idea of Hot Tubs - to soak your aches and pains away, and decided to give in a try.

She and her family were so taken with Hot Tubs, described as the latest fad - THE thing to do, that now she is in the business.

In fact, Mollie's enthusiasm borders on religious fervor.

So far the Rothmans have a Hot Tub installed at their Thornhill home, outside on the patio, as well as inside their ski chalet north of Barrie.
