A Good Milk Bailer

At the Riverside factory meeting
on Saturday evening, Mr. Thos.
Carson, gave a description of a
simple and practical milk bailer
that can be made by any tinsmith.
It consists of a square piece of tin
with a long handle attached to
surface.

square is pushed up and down
through the milk, thus
bringing every particle of the milk
to the surface, where it is thro-
ughly aired. It saves a lot of needless
work in bailing from one can to
another, no milk is lost by splash-
ing and it takes very little time to
thoroughly bail the milk, which in
the old way it was often only half
done because the bailer was in a
hurry or tired after a hard days
work. And again it can be used
to bail the mornings mail which by
the old way was almost impossible.
