The sympathy of the community is extended to Mr. John Cherry and family in their sad loss of a loving wife and mother.

Mrs. John Cherry died on Monday night at ten o'clock from blood poisoning which set in from a slight scratch on the nostril. She was sick only forty-eight hours. Drs. Macdougall and Morrow did all in human power to save her life but their skilled efforts were useless. Her death is all the more sad as it was so unexpected, she having enjoyed the best of health this past winter.

Mrs. Cherry, nee Miss Powell, was born in Goulbourn Township, July 1838. She moved to North Russell at the age of eighteen, where she resided until her marriage two years later.

She leaves a family of seven children, Robert, William and Hackett, of Russell, Mrs. Wm. Curry, of Almonte, Mrs. McVey, of Metcalfe, Mrs. Adams, Russell, and Mrs. D. Stearns, Marvelville.

Suicide at Metcalfe

In a fit of despondency brought on by several months' ill-health, Mrs. McCooey, of Metcalfe, Ont., ended her life by hanging herself in the barn. Her daughter had gone upstairs to rest and her husband had gone to a neighbor's place. He was not away more than half an hour and when he returned he missed his wife. He then went to the barn and found her lifeless body suspended from a rafter. Dr. Wallace, Metcalfe, was notified and he informed Dr. Sapie, of Ottawa, coroner. There will be no inquest.

Mrs. McCooey is survived by her husband, three sons and one daughter. The family are old residents of Osgoode Township, three miles from the village, and are held in the highest esteem.
