The rap dity with which the Postal Department is establishing rural mail delivery is shown by the fact that during the past four months two hundred postoffices were closed owing to the location of new routes. The major ty of these are in Ontario as new rural mail routes are being established dailey in this Province.

Prince Edward Island will soon have rural delivery over the Province no less than twenty-one country postoffices were closed during the four montl s.
