### Nearly A Serious Fire.

What nearly happened to be a most disastrous fire took place on Tuesday about noon when Mr Wm J Hume who was in his cow barn applying a coat of tar to a water tank which caught fire from a coal oil stove used in heating the tar.

Mr Hume endeavoured to extinguish the blazing tank but was unable to do so, he ran to a close neighbour and gave the alarm, by this time sparks had penetrated through the loft setting fire to the hay above, by this time a crowd had gathered and proceeded to pour water on the hay, but with no perceptible results. A hay knife was used in cutting down the hay on two sides of the fire and throwing it out through an opening made in the side of the barn. The two Chemical extinguishers were hurriedly despatched from the village and with their assistances and a continuous stream of water, the fire was brought under control, several cows were badly burned but not seriously.

Mr Hume's face and hands received severe burns, which was attended to by Dr Macdougall. The barns were erected only this summer with all modern improvements among the best in the Township.
