minister of Franktown, Lanark Co.
who has always been known as

The Late Thomas W. Hamilton.
Mr. Thomas W. Hamilton, one
of the eldest and most respected re-
-sidents of North Russell, passed
away to his eternal rest at an early
hour Sunday morning Nov. 27th,
after a very brief illness.

Deceased was in his 77th year and
was a son of the late Mr. and Mrs.
William Hamilton, who came from
Ireland in the year 1834. He was
married in 1877 to Matilda Loucks
of Russell, whom he leaves to mourn
his loss, also two sons Edwin
and Robert both of North Russell,
two brothers Andrew of Vairmede
Saskatchewan and George of Stan-
-dard Michigan, U. S. and three grand
-children.

The late Mr. Hamilton was one
of the veterans who took part in
the Fenian Raids 1866-70. He
was a member of the Loyal Orange
Lodge 268 in which since his initia-
-tion on Mar. 13th 1865 he is report-
-ed to have missed, but three of the
July celebration meetings.

The funeral which was largely
attended, was held at the home of
the deceased at 2 p.m. on Monday,
the services being conducted by
Rev. N.D. Patterson pastor of St.
Andrews Presbyterian church, after
which the Orange Burial Service
was read by the brethren of the or-
-der. Interment of the remains fol-
-lowed in the North Russell Cemetery.
The pall bearers were Messers,
Alfred, Arthur and John Morrow,
Alex and Robert Meharey and Ea-

nest Hamilton all nephews of the
deceased and members of the Orange
order.

Embrun Meeting
Ladies Liberal Club

The meeting held on Monday night
in Embrun, which was called by
the members of the Ladies Liberal
Club filled the town hall to capacity

Mrs Cyprien St Onge presiding
the chief speakers were Mrs Arthur
Belanger and Mr. O. Langois of
Ottawa. Mrs. Belanger strongly
emphasised the reason why the elec-
-tors should support Liberalism,
and made a strong appeal to the
women showing how they should
support the party of Liberty, Justice
and Progress, in dealing with the
Progressives, she said they have
no past, they ask the liberals for
support on the ground of what they
will do in the future, no record set-
-ting but vague promises.

Mr. O. Langois made a very eff-
-ective speech defining the Liberal
policy, giving the reasons why they
are entitled to the support of the
people in the present election.

Mr. Lafond was the last speaker
who supported the speeches made
by the previous speakers, advising
one and all to support the liberal
party, the great majority of those
present were ladies who by hearty
applause and enthusiasm make a
large majority assured for the liberal
candidate on Dec. 6th.
