## Good Roads

As announced in last week's Leader, a meeting was held in the Two Mac's Hall on Friday evening to discuss the question of getting something done this coming summer on the road south from this village to the Winchester boundary to connect up with the highway at the bridge and at the boundary. The attendance was not as large as could be expected, but what was lacking in numbers was made up in enthusiasm.

Quite a number from Marionville, including Rev. Fr. Olivier, were present, to endorse any and all efforts tending towards the hastening of work on the road. Mr. J. A. Gemble occupied the chair, and Mr. C. F. McArthur acted as secretary.

Brief addresses were given by Rev. Fr. Olivier, Adelard Marion, Mederic Marion, Geo. Dagenais, Geo. Sutherland, Stanley Stephenson, Dr. Macdougall, Robt. Fraser and others.

All were agreed that this was the connecting link which would make this the main artery of travel between the entire country south and east to Ottawa, and because of its importance, should take precedence over all other roads in the matter of getting work done.

The question of its importance to local industries, which is great was lost sight of in the greater good to the greater number.

In the light of the facts presented at this meeting, this road should be made at once. Without it, two excellent roads lead to nowhere, industries operate under a severe handicap, and those who of necessity are compelled to travel over it, suffer loss in vehicles, time and money.

With it, these two roads would be connected, industries would be relieved, and people would start out with some assurance of getting home the same day.

After discussion, it was decided to appoint a committee composed of about ten members, representative of all sections of the road, to prepare a memorial to present to the Counties' Council at their June meeting, this memorial to be prepared and copies made and sent by mail to each individual member of the Counties' Council.

Rev. Fr. Olivier was chosen as chairman, and the meeting adjourned.

We believe this to be a start in the right direction, and if followed up will give results. Let's all get behind and push.

A meeting was held in the Parish Hall, Marionville, last night to confirm the action taken at the meeting in Russell.

About 100 people were present and enthusiastically endorsed the proposed methods of getting the work started.

Rev. Fr. Olivier presided, and addresses were delivered by Reeve Emard, Deputy-reeve Hume, John Cumming, deputy-reeve of Winchester township, Andrew Walker, Dr. Proudfoot and others, and all agreed that the road was badly needed, and promised that all the influence and power at their disposal to help the good work along.

Mr. C. F. McArthur, secretary of the committee, submitted a copy of the proposed resolutions, and each one as it was read was immediately endorsed by the crowd. Every man present was fully aware of what the road would mean to him personally, and thus being alive to its advantages, were in favor of any method which will help to better conditions.

In closing, Fr. Olivier referred to the unanimous spirit which prevailed amongst the people at both ends of the road, and expressed his pleasure that both races could work so harmoniously for a common cause.
