George E. and John H. Sully

It is not often that we have to record the death of two members of the same family, but the family of George E. Sully, of Metcalfe, was doubly bereaved on Sunday last, when the father was taken, and on Monday morning, just 23 hours later, the son passed away.

The son, John H., who was about 25 years of age was taken ill first, with what was thought to be the flu, and was seriously ill. The father, who was in his 67th year, was about for a few days, was then stricken, and owing to his advanced years, the disease made rapid progress and he passed away on Sunday morning at 6.13.

The son was pronounced as doing fairly well, but at 5.15 on Monday morning, his heart failed, and he too joined the silent majority.

The double bereavement amounts to almost a tragedy, as it leaves aged mother without to take charge of affairs, the only surviving son residing in Los Angeles, California. He is now on his way home, with no knowledge of the sad news which awaits him.

Besides the widow and son there survive five daughters, of whom Mrs. Hackett Cherry, Russell, is one.

The double funeral took place on Monday afternoon, and the sight was a most pathetic one, as the two bodies were conveyed to their last resting place.

TOWNSHIP COUNCIL

Minutes of a regular meeting of Russell Township Council, held in the Forester's Hall, Russell, on Monday, June 5th,

The members were all present.

On motion of Messrs. Hume and Patenaude, the minutes of last meeting were read and adopted.

There being no appeals, only some clerical errors, the Court of Revision on Assessment Rolls for the Township of Russell and the Police Village of Russell and Embrun, was closed on motion of J. W. Hume and Wm. Wood.

Bylaw No. 4, Shaw Creek Drain was introduced and given a first reading on motion of A. Patenaude and P. Brisson.

Bylaw No. 3, to provide for expenditure on township roads was read a first, second and third time and finally passed on motion of J. W. Hume and Wm. Wood.

Council adjourned for lunch.

The Council assembled after lunch, all members being present.

The council instructed the road superintendent to open the ditch between the 2nd and 3rd concessions of the Township of Russell, opposite Lot 20 on the west side of the road, said ditch to be 2 feet deep, and to notify Alex. Allison that he must not put in a culvert less than 12 inches and that Angus Scharf continue said ditch to an outlet, on motion P. Brisson and Wm. Wood.

Adelard Marion was authorized to gravel 627 feet of the boundary between Russell and Winchester from Separate School No. 1. and he is to receive \$2.00 a day while employed and \$4.00 per day for teams on motion of J. W. Hume and A. Patenaude.

Moved by J. W. Hume, seconded by Wm. Wood, that this Council authorize the Clerk to prepare a bylaw, prohibiting any one from peddling meat, fish and game in the Township of Russell unless he first procures a license from the township, and said license to be granted on a permit from the inspector of the Board of Health, said license fee to be Twenty-five dollars per year, and that all butcher shops, slaughter houses, to be inspected at once by the inspector, and given a permit to run such butcher shops and slaughter houses, and if not holding a permit to be closed at once, and if not closed at once to be brought before a magistrate and fined. Carried.
