ENTECED INTO REST

Mrs. Thomas Hamilton

After nearly three years of illness there passed to the Great Stillness, a most respected and well beloved old lady, Mrs. Thomas Hamilton, of North Russell, in her 69th year.

About three years ago she suffered a stroke of paralysis, and while recovered somewhat, it was with difficulty she moved about.

When about seven weeks ago she had a bad fall, breaking her hip, she took to her bed, and gradually grew weaker, until Monday night at 11 o'clock her spirit took flight.

Deceased was born at Louck's Bridge, one mile east of this village, on April 6, 1855, the only daughter of the late Mr. and Mrs. Edwin Loucks.

About 47 years ago she married the late Thomas Hamilton, and moved with him to North Russell where she remained until her death.

After the death of her husband a few years ago she lived on the old homestead with her son Robert.

During her long life she was a most consistent Christian, and took an active interest in the welfare of St. Andrew's church, of which she was a member.

A good wife, a loving mother, an excellent neighbor, she will be missed both in the family and neighborhood.

The funeral took place yesterday afternoon at 2 o'clock, service being conducted at the house by the pastor, Rev. W. B. Morgan.

Interment was made in North Russell cemetery.

Surviving are her two sons Robert with whom she lived, and Edwin, on the next farm, and two brothers, William, of Russell, and Phiny, of Markdale, Ont.
