## Mr. Thomas Kinkaid

There passed from life on Saturday night one of the most respected citizens of our town in the person of Mr. Thomas Kinkaid at the age of 65 years.

Deceased had lived all his life on a farm about three miles south of town until a year ago, when he rented his farm and moved into the village.

He had not been feeling well for some time, but was able to be about most of the time, up to about two weeks ago, when he suffered a stroke of paralysis from which he never rallied, death occurring on Saturday night.

While still a young man he married Miss Stanley, of Osgoode, who with one son, Stanley, survive him, as do also two brothers, John and David, and one sister in the West. He was a quiet man, a good neighbor and friend and his death will be mourned by a large circle of friends.

The funeral, which was held on Monday at his late residence, was largely attended, being conducted by Rev. A. P. Menzies. Interment was made in the family plot in the Loucks Cemetery.

## MR. JOHN W. HUME

It was with real regret that we announced last week the death of Mr. John W. Hume at Lachute, Que.

Deceased was the type of man who sacrificed himself for the good of the community and gave his time and ability freely for the benefit of his fellow-citizens.

For several years he served as deputy-reeve, he was a director of the Agricultural Society, and at the time of his death was president of the West Russell Municipal Association and vice-president of the Plowmen's Association. He was a good observer and his advice was very practical. His life will be sadly missed.

In his home community he was postmaster, school trustee and road superintendent.

He was a good neighbor, a kind husband and father, and a citizen who was an asset to the township. After a service at Lachute his remains were brought to his home at Marvelville, from which the funeral was held on Thursday.

Services were conducted at the house by Rev. Woodside, after which interment was made in St. Paul's cemetery.

After the religious ceremony the beautiful ceremony of the Masonic Order was exemplified by Russell Lodge A.F. & A.M. of which he was a member.

He leaves to mourn his loss, besides his widow, six daughters, Mrs. Tace Wade, Russell, Mrs. E. T. Cowan, Vernon, Jean, Faym Point, Hazel, Helen and Elsie at home; two sons, William, and Harold on neighboring farms. Four sisters, Mrs. D. MacKerracher, Russell, Mrs. Alex Carlyle, Vancouver, Mrs. Lucy Crawford and Mrs. Maggie Sawyer, of Los Angeles and one brother, Professor Harold of Jacksonville, Florida.
