MRS. ALEX MACDONALD

The community was shocked on Sunday last to hear of the sudden and violent death of Mrs. Alex MacDonald, of Keamore.

The deceased and her husband were going to Ottawa to visit their daughter, Mrs. A. Morrison, and Mr. McDonald went to get the car. Mrs. MacDonald got ready and after locking the house stood waiting for him. He drove up, and she started across in front of the car to do something, and he became confused in shifting the gears and the car leaped forward, knocking her down and running over her body.

Dr. Byers was summoned and examination showed that both legs were broken, her ribs fractured, and her head badly hurt. She was rushed to an Ottawa hospital where she was found to be suffering from concussion of the brain and died soon from cerebral hemorrhage.

Mrs. McDonald was born in Osgoode township, and except for a few years in Ottawa and Vars, has always resided there. Her maiden name was Miss Margaret McCormick, daughter of the late John McCormick, and was the last of a family of three daughters and two sons.

Besides her husband, she leaves to mourn, one daughter, Mrs. Morrison.

The funeral was held on Tuesday afternoon from the residence of her daughter, Mrs. Morrison, to Spruighill cemetery.

The husband is prostrated with grief, while the sad occurrence has cast a gloom over the entire community.

The sorrowing friends have the heartfelt sympathy of the whole district.
