## Dr. MANSON CRAIG

On Thursday evening last Dr. Manson Graig, youngest son of the late Hector Craig, of Kenmore, passed away at the homestead after an illness of 17 years.

He had been an exceptionally bright student, and at Kemptville High School and the University had always passed his exams with honors.

After graduation he started to practice and kept on with study intending to specialize, but the strain proved too great and he was attacked with nervous trouble and his practice returned to him. He never recovered. He suffered greatly, death being a relief.

The funeral took place Saturday afternoon from his late residence, the service being conducted by Rev. H. Woodside, interment being made in the family plot at Springhill.

He leaves to mourn, four brother sons, at the homestead, Arthur C., barrister of Ottawa, and James and Daniel of the West, and one sister, Mrs. Allan Stevenson, of Russell.

Much sympathy is extended to the bereaved.

## ALBERT HARRINGTON

On Friday last death came to Mr. Albert Harrington, one of the most highly respected citizens of this district, at the residence of his sister, Mrs. Hugh Morrow.

Deceased, about two years ago suffered from liver trouble, which necessitated an operation. For a time he seemed to have regained his health, but about four months ago the trouble returned and another operation was performed but he did not recover and grew weaker until the end.

He was one of the kindest of men and during his working life of about 35 years he had made cheese and never had any trouble in his factories.

A good citizen, he could always be counted on to give of his time and means to any good cause and as a friend he was always ready with the helping hand.

He never married and made his home with his brother David.

The funeral was held on Sunday afternoon, service being conducted at the house by Rev. A. P. Menzies assisted by Rev. Nimmo. Interment was made in North Russell cemetery, and over a hundred cars attended, showing the esteem in which he was held.

The deceased was tendered the last rites of the Orange Order, of which he was a life long member.

He leaves to mourn seven brothers, Norman, of Washington, D. C., Henry, of Osgoode, David, James, John, Andrew and Thomas of Russell, and one sister, Mrs. Hugh Morrow.

The sympathy of all is extended to the bereaved.

We regret to report the death of Mrs. Hugh Harrington, one of the oldest and most respected citizens of this district. The funeral is being held this afternoon. Fuller particulars will be given later.

## ARTHUR CARSCADDEN

On Friday night there passed to his reward a most highly respected resident of this section, at the Ontario Hospital, in the person of Mr. Arthur Carscadden.

A few years ago he contracted anaemia, which later became pernicious, and his health gradually failed.

About 18 months ago he was taken to the hospital for treatment and at last reports was doing well, but pneumonia set in about two weeks ago and he passed away.

Deceased was a life-long resident of this district and was a quiet unassuming citizen, who minded his own business and was a good worker until his illness.

He married while a young man, Miss Morris, who predeceased him about 15 years ago. To this union there was born a son, and daughter Clifton, of Syracuse, and Miss Lola of Ottawa. Besides these he leaves to mourn one brother, Harry, of Russell, and two sisters Mrs. Robt. McKeown, Osgoode, and Mrs. Wills Fulton, Ottawa.

The remains were brought to his brother's home on Sunday, and the funeral was held Monday afternoon at St. Mary's church where service was conducted by Rev. F. Weegar, after which interment was made in the Anglican cemetery. The sympathy of a host of friends is extended to the bereaved.
