**MR. ROBERT SCOTT**  
The Grim Reaper again visited this district on Saturday last and removed another and highly respected resident, the person of Mr. Robert Scott, his 77th year. Deceased had been failing in health for about four years, but was able to go out and do light work, was around usual the first of the week, but early Wednesday morning he was taken with paralysis, from which he failed to rally, passing away on Saturday morning.

He was born and grew up in North Russell, being clear his father's farm from the bush, and could tell many tales of pioneer life. He was married while a young man to Ms. Woods, who survives him. They settled on a farm a short distance from his birthplace, when they raised a family of two daughters and four sons, viz., Mrs. J. A. Buckingham and Mrs. I. B. Graham, of Russell, Messrs. William and Fred, of Russell, H. Scott, of Ottawa, and E. L. Scott, Dryden, Ont.

Mr. Scott was a member of the council some years ago. He had also been president of the local Agricultural Society and for a number of years a trustee of the church. A Presbyterian he later joined the United Church, where he was faithful in attendance.

The funeral was held Monday at 2.00 p. m. from the residence of his daughter, Mrs. Buckingham to the United Church, where the service was conducted by his pastor, Rev. D. C. Manro, assisted by Rev. Lr. Ross, of Erskine Church, Ottawa.

The funeral was under the Orange Order, of which deceased had been a member for over half a century, and at the time of his death he was the oldest member of the Royal Scalet Chapter.

Interment was made in the family plot in North Russell cemetery.

He was the type of citizen who will be missed in his family circle, his church, his lodge and community.

The sympathy of all is extended to the bereaved.
