On Sunday morning last there passed away at an Ottawa hospital a former resident of this town, Mrs. Nelson Ronan, after having been ill for about six years.

Deceased, whose maiden name was Miss Nellie McInnes, was raised in Cumberland township, and about 35 years ago came to Russell as the bride of Mr. Ronan, and lived here until about two years ago, when she moved to Ottawa, where she died.

For the past six years she had suffered from anaemia and complications, and was taken to the hospital on Saturday morning, where she lived until Sunday.

The funeral took place Tuesday afternoon from Ottawa to the United Church here, where service was conducted by Rev. Murphy of Cobourg Baptist Church assisted by Rev. Thos. McNaught, of Russell United Church, Rev. H. Molins, of Fourth Avenue Baptist Church, Ottawa, who sang a beautiful solo, and Rev. T. P. Snaver, of Richmond.

Interment was made in the Ronan plot in the Methodist cemetery.

She leaves to survive an adopted daughter, Jean, and some nieces and nephews.
