## IN YOUR GARDEN AND IN MINE

This short article is to draw your attention to several seasonable hints that have a direct bearing on your garden of next year. This coming month, August, marks the time when gardeners should be busy, finishing their dividing of Iris and Peonies. I would impress upon you the fact that the fall is drawing near and if you delay—if you leave off the work of dividing Iris and Peonies until late fall you need blame yourself if your Iris and Peonies next year are poor. The answer to the unspoken why is simply that neither Iris or Peony roots will have the chance to become even well established in their new quarter. Nor are Iris and Peonies the only plants that you should move early: That Oriental poppy should be moved in August and only in August. The Oriental Poppy during August will emerge from its dormant state and start sending up a rosette of leaves for next season and it is much better to move this beautiful plant when it is dormant than later and the reason is simply that you do not disturb the root growth when the plant is dormant. Think it over, examine your Iris beds—if they are crowded, move them, divide them and the same goes for Peonies. Again you will want to put in new Tulips, Jonquils, Narcissus, etc., and this will take time and BE SURE TO ORDER YOUR BULBS EARLY so that you will have them on hand when you have the time to plant them.

Truly August should be a busy month for the gardener for there are so many seasonable things to do that the month seems to fly away. However if we pay a bit of attention to gardening in season, August will not seem so crowded. So just give the above a bit of thought and you won't crowd August.

## RUSSELL SHARES IN HYDRO REDUCTIONS

Russell will share to the extent of \$907.00 per year in Eastern Ontario Hydro system rate reductions which will effect for Eastern Ontario consumers total saving on monthly bills of \$253,096 per year.

The estimate of saving to Russell Municipality is apportioned as follows:—Domestic lighting \$765.00; commercial lighting \$142.00.

Consumers in 12 municipalities also are to receive refunds totalling \$107,928; there will also be refunds to 31 municipalities themselves on municipally used power totalling \$26,417; so the total estimated benefit to Eastern Ontario consumers from Hydro's action will be \$387,442 per year.

Consumers will have the \$107,928 refunded by deduction from their monthly bills, while the \$253,096 will come off monthly bills in the form of rate reductions. The \$26,417 to be refunded municipalities will benefit taxpayers in general.

The Ontario Hydro Commission's report for the year ending Oct. 31, 1936, shows that the financial results of the operation of the Eastern Ontario System were very satisfactory to all municipalities supplied on this System. Total revenue received by the Commission from all municipalities, amounted to \$2,021,138. The total cost of power for the year, as provided to be paid by them under the Power Commission Act, amounted to \$1,853,980. The surplus of \$167,158 arising from the operation of the Commission was returned to 40 municipalities and in no case was it necessary to collect additional costs from any municipality.

A general reduction of \$3.00 per horsepower in the interim rate for power to all municipalities of this System, has been approved by the Commission. This general reduction is in addition to other reductions to be made in some municipalities on account of favourable conditions during 1936. Fifty municipalities served on this system will receive this reduction in the interim rate.

The Commission has also reviewed and analyzed the financial situation in connection with the distribution of power within these municipalities. From the result of this analysis, which was based upon the 1936 revenue and operating costs, the Commission recommended that the rates to be charged to domestic, commercial and power consumers be reduced in a large number of cases.

In addition to the 50 municipalities served on a cost basis, there are 5 municipalities served direct by the Commission. 5 on a fixed contract basis, or a total of 57 municipalities. Of these 57 municipalities 46 will receive a substantial reduction in the rates to be charged to consumers and the rates in the other will remain unchanged.

The operating reports of the municipalities on the Eastern Ontario System show that the municipal electric utilities, so served, obtained a total revenue for the year 1936 of \$3,526,475.11. The total expenses for these utilities for the same year amounted to \$3,108,175.71 after providing for the cost of power, operating and fixed charges. The net surplus obtaining for that year amounted to \$418,299.40.

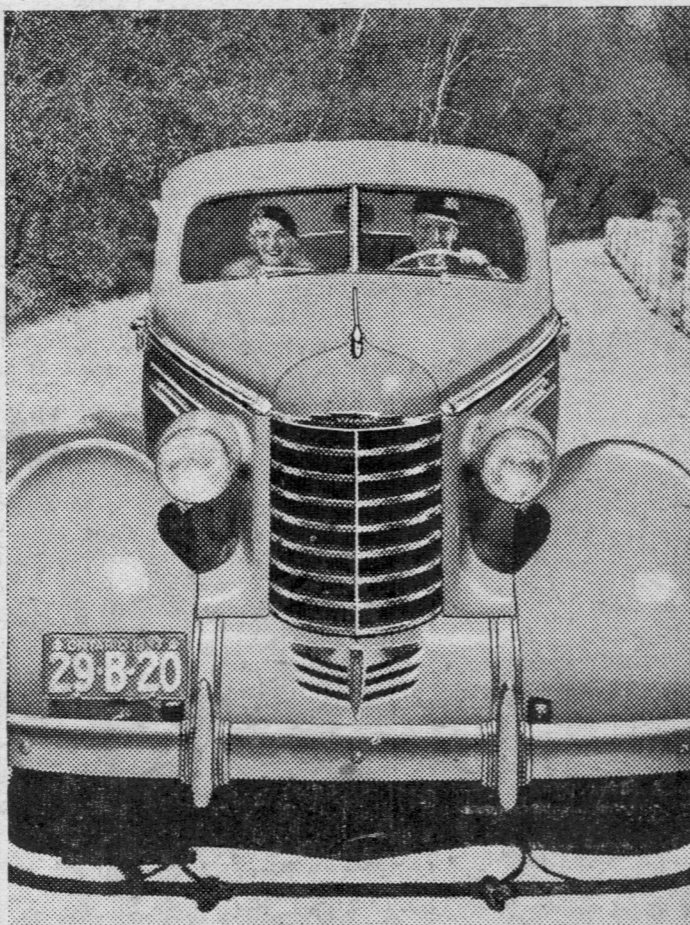
