## Community Mourns Passing Mrs. Stewart

The funeral of Mrs. Charles Hall Stewart, Russell, who passed away in an Ottawa hospital on Thursday, Jan. 6th, was held from the funeral home of Hulse and Playfair, Ottawa, on Saturday last where a large number of friends gathered to pay a final tribute of respect to the memory of a woman who had through her home and affiliation with various organizations earned the undying affection of an entire community.

Mrs. Stewart was the wife of Mr. Charles H. Stewart, manager of the Russell branch of the Bank of Nova Scotia. She was born in Saint Johns N.B., where she spent her early life and received her education. Some 26 years ago she married Mr. Stewart and removed to Ontario, later coming to Russell, where she had, for 20 years, since resided. She took an active part in church work, the Women's Institute, the Women's Curling Club and gave much of her time in the direction and staging of many of the splendid plays presented by the Young People's Society. Needy families in the district will revere her memory as a friend and wise councillor for many of her kind acts were done in an unobtrusive way. Perhaps the greatest tribute we could pay her is that she was a gentlewoman.

Left to mourn her loss, in addition to her husband, are two sons: John A. P. Donald C. Stewart, both of Cornwall, Ont.; a sister, Mrs. Geo. Ferris, of Sussex, N.B. and one brother, William E. Pooley, of Moncton. The funeral service was held from Hulse & Playfair funeral home with the family pastor, Rev. Thos. McNaught, officiating, assisted by Rev. F. S. Milliken, of Stewarton United and Rev. A. P. Menzies, of Westboro United.

Interment was made in Beechwood Cemetery. Among the wealth of floral offerings, besides telegrams and messages of regret received by the bereaved family, were tributes from Canadian National Railway Employees of Cornwall; friends of Russell Lodge No. 479, A.F. and A.M.; Women's Association of Russell United Church; choir of the same church; staff of the Bank of Nova Scotia, Russell; officers and members, Kitchener Lodge, Royal Arch Masons, Russell; Madden Motor Sales, Russell; Russell Curling Club; McArthur-Warner Ltd. and McArthur Motor Sales and many others from individuals.

## Accepting Lower Salary for Post

Romeo Begin, M.L.A. for Russell County, resigned Tuesday night as clerk-treasurer of the town of Eastview and accepted reappointment at a lower salary of \$1,500 a year. He had been receiving \$2,100.

Eastview council, in its first meeting of the year, appointed J. A. Casault, tax collector, as assistant clerk. Mr. Begin's letter of resignation was read by Mayor Donat Grandmaitre, who said he had consulted with Mr. Begin, who agreed to accept reappointment at the reduced figure in view of the fact that he would not be able to give his full time to the position.

Members of council spoke highly of the service rendered the town by Mr. Begin, who has been clerk-treasurer for 15 years. He was elected a member of the Ontario House at the last provincial election.

A letter was read from John Innis, reeve of Gloucester township and chairman of the finance committee of Carleton County Council, in which he thanked Eastview council for paying its county rate for 1937 and arrears in full. Mr. Casault reported that tax collections for the year 1937 were \$26,184 higher than in 1936.

The report of Chief of Police Richard Mannion indicated that \$4,519 had been collected last year in license fees and fines. Council decided to have the ice in the Rideau River cut this year by town workers instead of asking the city of Ottawa to do the work.

## Russell Township Council Meeting

Russell Township Council met in the Forrester's Hall with all hands on deck, the new Reeve, Mr. Mederic Bouchard, in the chair and the largest turnout of interested, disinterested and indifferent spectators on hand that has been seen at a council meeting for some time.

Business was conducted with dispatch and consequently the public officers were soon taken up and over by appointees. Because of the speed of the council petitioners being given time to state their respective cases and the cases were many, ranging from road, drains to relief. In the matter of relief the reeve emphatically stated that every able-bodied man seeking relief would get relief, but he would have to work for same or rather earn his relief. To this end relief-seekers in the west end will be given jobs working in the stone quarry. In the matter of relief a rather peculiar case presented itself and concerned a man with a large family who some time ago underwent an operation for appendicitis. The operation, insofar as the appendix was concerned, was a success but left the man in a condition that rendered him incapable of working. Said operation was performed in an Ottawa institution and now an Ottawa doctor claims that another operation will put the man back on his feet and able to work. This man is on relief and wants the township to pay his doctor bill with the county paying his hospital care.

To do or not to do was the question and it was decided that it would be in the interests of economy if they agreed to this man's plan. This is just an example of some of the momentous questions presented to the council for consideration.
