McArthur, of Russell and Oscar Labelle, of Clarence Creek, honorary presidents; Tace Wade, of Russell, first vice-president; Roy Shaver, of Finch, second vice-president, and Bruce Smith, acting agricultural representative at Morrisburg, secretary-treasurer.

On resolution by A. Walker, of Russell, the association decided to invite the Ontario Plowmen's Association to hold the provincial match in Russell as soon as possible. The place of the 1938 match has already been chosen. J. W. MacRae, of Lochiel, is representative from the Eastern Counties' Association to the provincial organization.

A prize list committee was appointed at the meeting to comprise J. W. MacRae, Lochiel; Wm. E. Marshall, South Mountain; Bruce Smith, Morrisburg; F. Larose, Plantagenet; W. M. Croskery, Ottawa; H. M. McLeod, Kemptville; and A. V. Langton, of Alexandria. This committee held a short session following the general meeting.

The next meeting of the association will take place in June when arrangements for the various plowing matches in the district will take place. At this meeting the date for the Eastern counties match also will be set.
