Local and Personal

Mrs. Sandy Waddell had the misfortune to slip and fall heavily on the icy sidewalk sustaining a broken wrist and putting an ugly cut in her forehead, which required three stitches to close.

For years American buyers have been able to purchase first class Canadian cattle from breeders in and around Russell, and this augurs well for the agriculturists of the district and clearly shows that there is always a demand for purebred stock.

Due to the icy condition of the roads over the week-end visitors by motor were scarce and far between. Some venturesome souls skated from Morewood, and a number skated from Metcalfe, seven miles from Russell. They report the roads fine for skating but decidedly poor for motoring.

Mr. Claude M. Hinman, Deaneboro, N.Y., recently purchased seventeen head of purebred Holstein cattle from breeders in Russell and Gengarry counties. The cattle were selected from herds of Mr. Ralph T. Wade, Russell, and Mr. F. C. McLennan, of Lancaster.

Mr. Leonard Murphy, Waddington, N.Y., purchased seven head of Holsteins from Mr. G. Erskine Robertson, Osgoode Station, and the estate of Thos. Campbell, Vernon, at the same time, Murphy Bros. bought 20 head from George G. Acres and Charles L. Acres, Vernon, Ont., and Wm. Booth, Russell.

Russell Women's Institute Meeting

The regular monthly meeting of the Russell Women's Institute was held on Tuesday evening, Feb. 1st, at the home of Mrs. Arthur Shelp, with the president, Mrs. Arthur Munday, in the chair.

Following the usual opening and business period, Mrs. John Harrington gave a very interesting paper on "Historical Research." Most graphic indeed was the chapter on Russell and the surrounding district and many were the amusing incidents of people and places within the ken of most of the members. Notable among the relics and heirlooms on display was a sugar bowl brought to this country by a descendant of Sir Frederick Banting's family. Documents of membership in the Knight Templars issued in Ireland in 1826 and beautiful cut glass wine glasses 125 years old, brought also from the Green Isle by descendants of Mrs. John Harrington. Mrs. Arthur Shelp's contribution consisted of linen sheets woven and made by her great grandmother, Mrs. Katharine Stewart, and dated 1859, a number of wine glasses with gold ornamentation given to a member of her family by Lord Strathcona, and a set of silver fish knives and forks with carved ivory handles of exquisite workmanship.

Considerable business was transacted. A sum of money voted to be sent to the Chinese Relief Fund. It was decided to make application for the use of the Travelling Library, and it is hoped all the members will avail themselves of this privilege for better reading.

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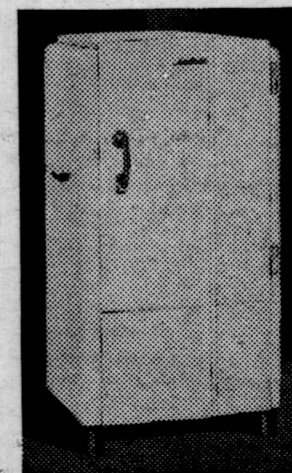
