## Decision Rendered Concerning Fire

The following decision was handed down by Judge MacKay and was the result of a court case concerning a fire which destroyed a large barn on the farm of Mr. Gilbert Harten.

Due to a disagreement between the Insurance co. and Mr. Harten regarding the policy the disagreement went to court in September of last year and the judgment was just recently published.

Ella Harten vs. Grenville Patron Mutual Fire Insurance Co.—Trial at Ottawa with a jury.

The plaintiff's action is under a policy of insurance issued pursuant to a written application. Duncan McIlraith, for the plaintiff; J. D. Watt, for the defendants.

Taking the two answers to question 1 and 2, together with the note of the agent, I cannot find that the applicant made an untruthful answer within the meaning of the clause in the application quoted above. There will be judgment for the plaintiff for the amount of the first two items in her claim, namely, \$2,150, together with interest at five per cent. per annum to run from 60 days after completion of proof of loss. The plaintiff is entitled to her costs of the action.

## OBITUARY

**DR. ALEXANDER M. MCKAY**  
Mrs. H. H. Shepherd received the sad news on Thursday last that her brother, Dr. Alexander Moore McKay, veterinary, of Calgary, has passed away suddenly with a heart attack.

Dr. McKay was well and favorably known in this district, having been born in Morewood, 65 years ago. He was a son of the late William McKay and his wife, Minnie Gillespie. He had practised in Winchester for about 12 years before moving to Calgary some 32 years ago. Besides practising his profession, he owned a farm near Calgary on which his son lives, and was well known as a breeder of pure bred stock.

Dr. McKay leaves to mourn him, his wife, formerly Molly McVeigh, a daughter of the late John McVeigh, of Vars, and one son, William, in Alberta, and a daughter Bessie, now Mrs. D. J. Hutchings, of Winnipeg; his sister, Mrs. Shepherd, of Russell, and a brother, Dr. James McKay, a mental specialist of New Westminster, B.C. Mrs. Shepherd and Dr. McKay's family have the sympathy of the community in their sorrow.

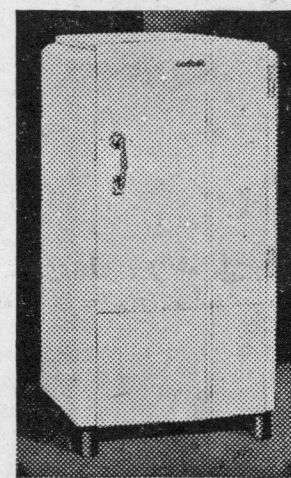
