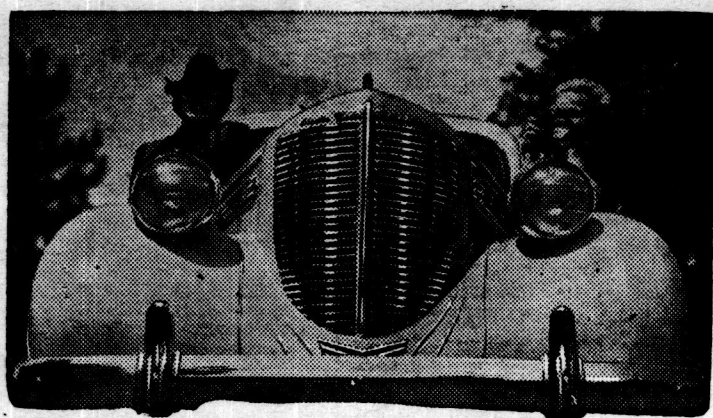

OBITUARY

ROBERT A. MACGREGOR

The funeral of Robert Arthur MacGregor whose death occurred in Ottawa, was held to the Church of St. Andrew's and St. Paul's, where a large number of relatives and friends gathered to pay a final tribute of respect to his memory.

Born at Felton in 1867, he was the son of the late Mr. and Mrs. Alexander MacGregor, pioneer settlers of the district. Engaged in farming and stock breeding, he was a recognized agriculturist of Russell county. Retiring some twenty years ago he and Mrs. MacGregor took up residence in Russell, where Mrs. MacGregor, the former Eliza Jane Morrow, predeceased him in 1933. Shortly after his retirement he devoted his spare time to the nursery business, meanwhile carrying on the routine of rural mail-carrier, a post he conscientiously and honorably filled for twenty years.

Left to mourn his loss is an adopted son, James Charlton of Prescott.

The funeral service was conducted by the Rev. Thomas McNaugh of the Church of St. Andrew's and St. Paul's United, with interment taking place in North Russell cemetery. Many beautiful floral offerings testified to the esteem in which the late Mr. MacGregor was held by the community. The pallbearers were: Alfred Long, Alfred Morrow, John Paul, Peter MacGregor, Andrew Walker and James Hay.
