Marauder mars Rombough Christmas

It was a night Meredith and Lois Rombough will never forget.

Mr. and Mrs. Rombough, of 3 Mill St., Russell, were savagely attacked Dec. 1 when they returned home to surprise a burglar in an upstairs bedroom.

"We knew someone was in the house because we saw the light on upstairs. We usually leave lights

on when we're out but we had gone into town early in the afternoon and, thinking we'd be home before dark, hadn't left any on," a shaken Mrs. Rombough said.

It was about 8:15 p.m. and they discovered the heavy wooden door to the house had been kicked

"Mrs. Cecil Hitsman next door said she heard a bang shortly

after 8 p.m. so we would have come in on the heels of the breakin. It's easy to think we should've gone to the neighbors then and called police but we acted on impulse," she said.

When Mr. Rombough went to the foot of the stairs and yelled 'Who's up there?', a man charged downstairs and rolled, knocking him off his feet.

"Meredith banged his head on the piano and was knocked out for a few seconds. When he came to, the man was pounding him on the mouth, lip and nose and going for his eyes. They say they go for the eyes so you won't be able to identify them," she said.

"The man grabbed a glass ornament and smashed it on Meredith's head. I grabbed the ornament and got it away from the guy but he hit me with the back of his hand and his fist three or four times and drove me back against the post."

She said the man smashed his hand through a window in the

door as he rushed outside. Mr. Rombough tacked the man in the yard "and was getting the better of him but had to let him go because the guy was biting his finger and would have bitten it right off". The man ran to a car parked a short way down the street.

"Meredith tried to get the licence number but he was dazed and bleeding and it was too dark even though I'd flipped on the outside light," she said.

The man could not be clearly identified because there were no lights on in the downstairs of the

Trash pick-up for all

Township-wide garbage pickup beginning Jan. 1 is Russell council's Christmas gift to taxpayers.

Of course, taxpayers will have to foot the \$35,000 bill but Councillor Baird McNeill hopes there won't be any appreciable change in individual tax rates.

However, the final effect of the new service won't be clear until closer to budget time, Mr. McNeill explained. The full cost will break down to an average of \$2.50 a month per pickup point less for residences and more for businesses.

Embrun man, who Mr. McNeill says has considerable experience in the field. The councillor added that there was some surprise at the low bid.

"We didn't know how he could afford to do the job for so little."

The new service will replace separate garbage collection which has been operating in Russell and Embrun villages as well as extend pickup to the rural area.

Council feels the \$35,000 is money well spent, Mr. McNeill stressed.

Garbage removal is now costing about \$18,000 for the two villages and another \$15,000 a year is spent on township dump maintenance.

"We think we can save money at the dump because the new service should result in fewer people casually taking their garbage there."

The new contractor will pick up virtually all household and commercial refuse but not heavy, combersome discards - rolls of wire for example.

Mr. McNeill said a circular will be mailed to residents to outline pick-up days in various parts of the township and explain the new procedure in general.


