

CASTOR CUPBOARDS

This recipe makes a large, moist cake which keeps well. Grease and flour a 9 x 13 cake pan. Bake at 350 for 45 minutes.

Sift together the following:

- 2 cups flour
- 2 tsp. soda
- 1 tsp. salt
- 1 tsp. cinnamon or nutmeg

Cover 2 cups of raisins with warm water for five minutes and drain.

Chop 1/2 cup of nuts.

Grate 2 cups of apples and 3 cups of carrots.

Beat 2 cups of white sugar, 1/2 cup of oil, and 4 eggs.

Add flour mixture to oil mixture.

Icing can be made by mixing 4 oz. Philadelphia cheese, 2 tsp. vanilla, and 1 cup of icing sugar.

Church for Sale

You won't see a sign on the Russell Baptist Church because Reverend James Paul feels "it would look like we were selling out the Lord."

But for sale it is, because the 100-year-old, white frame church on Castor Street near the corner of Concession Street can no longer meet the needs of the parish, Rev. Paul said.

The church has no basement for parish activities, little parking, is so difficult to heat that it's virtually unusable in winter — Russell parishioners double up with their Kenmore counterparts in cold weather — and the floor is so badly heaved that the minister was prompted to urge the congregation to hasten in its search for a new site before he disappeared from view.

The parish has its eye on a site in the village for a new, roomier church, but it must first sell the

existing building which was moved from a site north of the village in 1899.

The building has been for sale for two months with a few nibbles but the problem Rev. Paul admits, is what to do with a used church. Barring the possibility of anyone wanting to start up a new cult, the building could be renovated as a residence or business but the institutional zoning would have to be changed.

The reverend suggests that one use could be as an annex to the nearby registry office which is scheduled for an addition to relieve cramped space. The church would be perfect for storing the overflow of bulky registry files, he said.

The price? Well suffice to say that heaven can't wait much longer.
