can't get any action we're not ruling out some kind of action ourselves."

Those were the words of Alan Welsh, president of the Forest Park East Homeowners Association, as he explained that residents are counting on the Prescott Russell MLA to bring their crusade to a fruitful end.

Residents have been pressing for lower speed limits along county road 3 following the death of Robbie Morency, 12, in July. The youth was killed while trying to cross the county road on his bicycle. Outraged parents have been demanding that the speed limit along the road be reduced from 80 km/hr to 50 km/hr and that fourway stop signs be erected at the intersection of county roads 3 and 5.

Welsh says concern has mounted in recent days as children return to classes. County road 3 passes in front of Cambridge Public School. The speed limit is 80 km/hr in front of the school.

Prescott-Russell Counties and we're hoping his efforts will pay off," Mr. Welsh said.

"We sent letters to the Ontario Education Ministry and the Ministry of transportation and

communications but they both claim the matter is under the jurisdiction of Cambridge council and that a decision must come from there."

Mr. Welsh is hopeful that Prescott-Russell will lower the speed limit and erect the stop signs. But he warns residents may take action on their own if Mr. Belanger's efforts fail.

FINAL NOTICE SEPT. 15 DEADLINE

Sanitary Sewers Village of Russell

In July, 1979, a Notice and an Invoice showing Plan A or Plan B, namely for your choice of prepaying the Frontage and Connection charges, was sent to you and your final decision has to be decided upon or before September 15, 1980.

This is to advise you that the deadline of September 15, 1980 will not be extended. As the sanitary Sewer System is a Provincial jurisdiction, the Ministry of Environment will not consider prepaid payments after September 15, 1980. The unpaid portion will be charged against each property for a period of 40 years.

It is also important that, whether or not your property is hooked up to the system, the monthly charges will become effective October 1, 1980. As at July 15, 1980, 54 properties are not hooked up. The monthly usage charge does not apply to vacant lots. So whether your property is hooked up or not as of October 1, 1980, the usage charges will be enforced under the authority of By-Law 20-79 Paragraph 9. Please be governed accordingly.
