Russell Warriors need a boost

The Russell Warriors began their fourth season two weeks ago and from all indications, it's not going to be a banner year either for the team or the fans who pay to watch what is called Intermediate C Hockey.

The league has fallen on hard times and has been going downhill at a fast rate since its inception. Only four teams, Russell, Embrun, Limoges and Casselman remain involved; two teams voluntarily dropped out following the 1980-81 season because the league has banned body contact. Now it's almost as exciting as watching your grass grow. The rule was put into effect to curb fighting and while it might do that, it also takes something out of the game: excitement.

If the league really wanted to reduce violence, it should have increased penalties which would deter players from fighting. Fighting should be eliminated from all levels of the game but not at the expense of the product, especially when the players are in the over-18 age bracket.

The Warriors play uninspiring, monotonous, listless hockey - at best. Their offensive talent is good; the team scores lots of goals. Where it lacks is defensively and in the goaltender position. In two recent games, the Warriors blew three goals leads in both games, losing one and tying one. Changes must be made if the Warriors are to be considered serious contenders. The defence is sloppy, they're constantly caught out of position, resulting in many twoon-ones and the occasional partial breakaway. Defence is a major problem and it is important Russell lessen mistakes in the defensive zone if it hopes to turn this disastrous season.

After their initial season in which the team enjoyed great success, the team has become the doormats of the league.

The Warriors won only five in 25 games two years ago (they managed five ties), and were just as pathetic last year even though they did play excellent hockey at times. Early last season, they rode a three-game winning streak before the roof caved in. Consistency is vital and the Warriors can use it desperately. Over the past two seasons, Russell has obtained some excellent talent, only to lose it to other leagues providing a bigger challenge.

The league would improve greatly if it would promote itself.

Never have I received a call from a

league official offering stories on completed games or even the standings and scoring leaders. To create interest among the fans, why not get them involved during one of the intermissions?


They could have a Showdown-type competition in which the winner receives two tickets to an Ottawa 67's hockey game or something of that nature. More posters should be put up and not just in Russell but in Embrun and Metcalfe also.

Russell made a grave mistake by switching hockey from Sunday afternoons to Friday nights. The Metcalfe Jets usually play Fridays and it's hard to attract people to an Intermediate C game when Junior B is available seven miles away.

I remember one game in Metcalfe last year when there were at least 30 people from Russell watching the Jets do battle with the Winchester Hawks. If there is a next year, and I hope there is, the Warriors should seriously consider reverting to Sunday afternoon hockey. I'd also hope the league reinstates body contact. Maybe the hockey would return to the level played in the first year when Russell drew large numbers to their games, especially during the playoffs.

Intermediate hockey can be sold in Russell — with some hard work. Otherwise, the Warriors will disappear into oblivion.
