International Contest For Sea Cadets

Sea Cadets of many countries are expected to compete in an annual International Small Bore Rifle Competition for Sea Cadets from 14 to 18 years of age.

Organized and sponsored by the Navy League of Canada to commemorate the 1955 Diamond Jubilee, it will be a team target shoot with .22 rifles for an International Trophy to be put up by the Navy League.

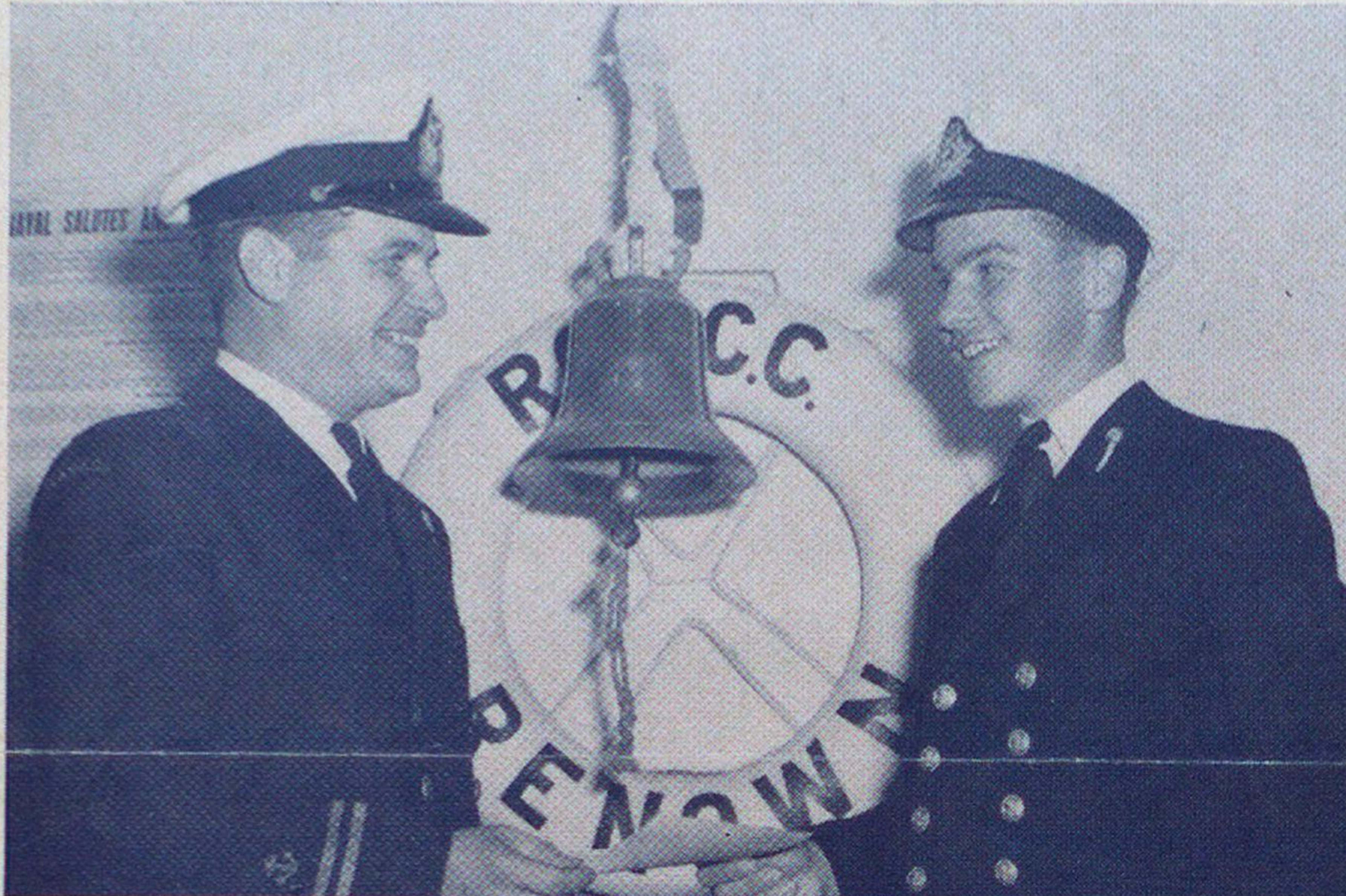
Acceptances are already to hand from nine countries, including Canada, which have agreed to participate. They are Australia, New Zealand, Rhodesia, South Africa, Ireland, Wales, Scotland and England. Other teams from the Commonwealth, Sweden and other countries are also expected to submit entries.

Judges of the international competition will be the Dominion of Canada Rifle Association. Each participating country will send in the targets and scores of their three top entrants prior to Oct. 31st each year. The 20-yard D.C.R.A. target and the .22 calibre rifle issued in each country will be standard for the event.

Any Sea Cadet unit or Corps may take part, provided their team members are 14 to 18 years of age, inclusive, and that no Sea Cadet is a member of more than one competing team. All contest shoots must be supervised by properly accredited observers.

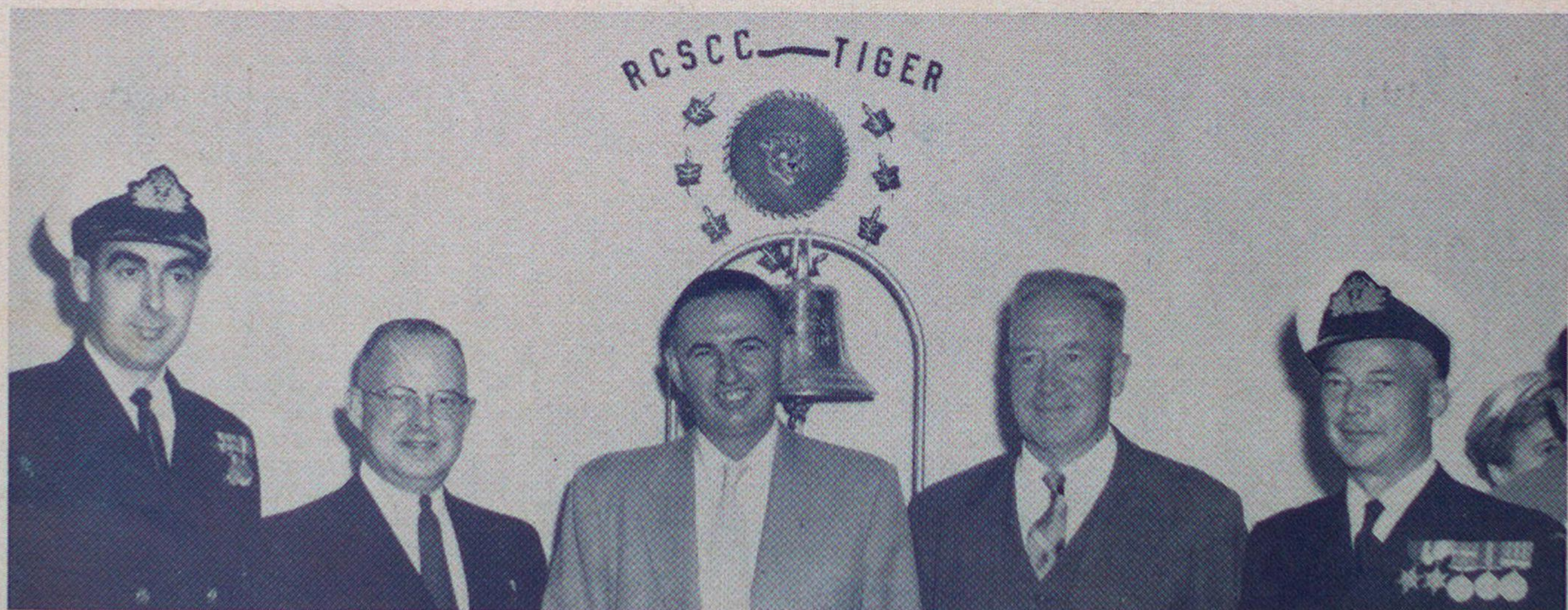
Details of the International Challenge Trophy, to be given by the Navy League of Canada, the sponsors of the contest, will be announced later.

CONWAY SCHOLARSHIP WINNER
