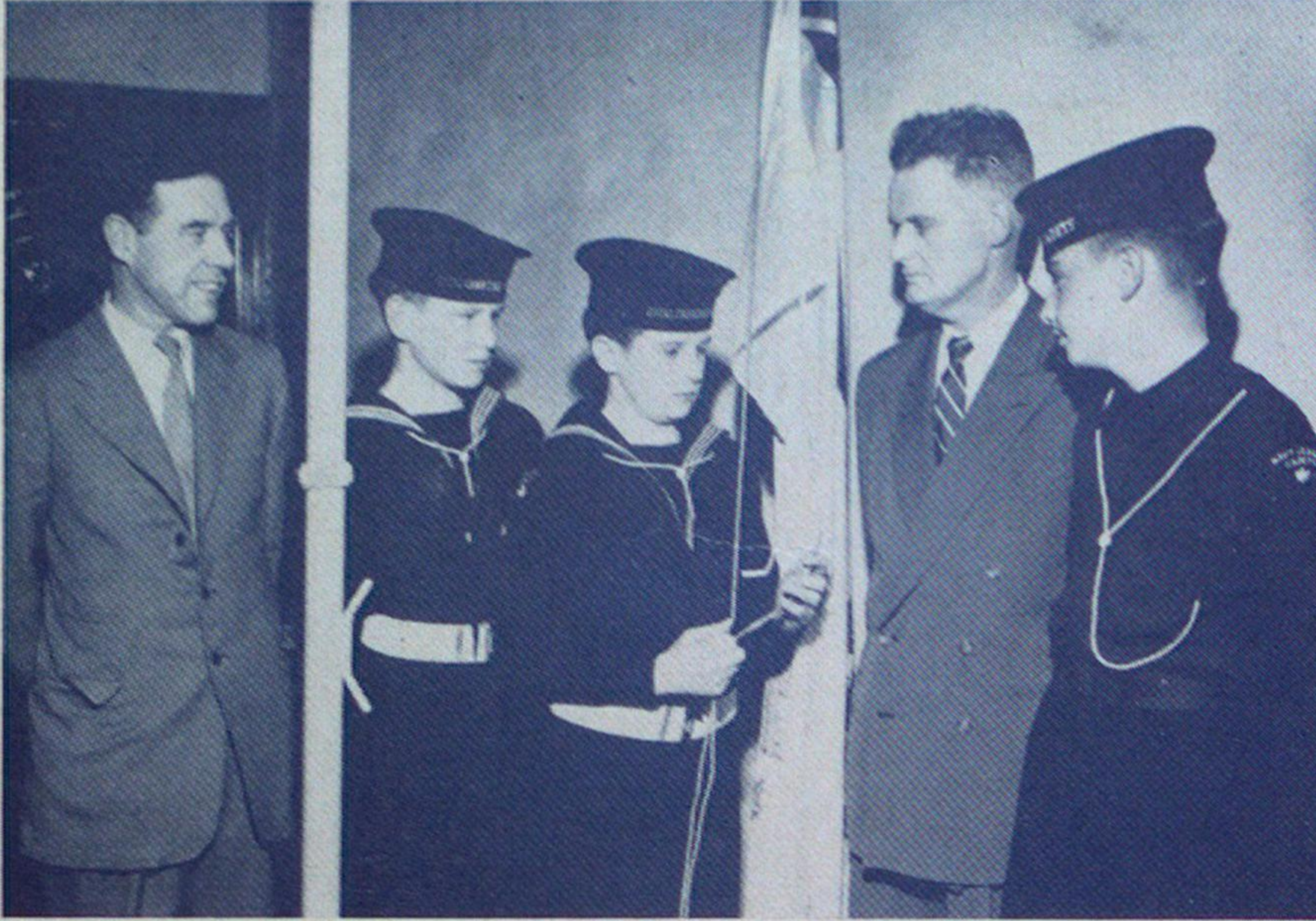


FATHER AND SON NIGHT AT STRATFORD

Sea Cadet Voyagers Return Home

Sea Cadets James Stamper, Brantford, and James Woodacre, Belleville, have returned from a three month cruise to the sunlit seaports of Bermuda, the Caribbean and South American waters in H.M.C.S. Quebec.

Members of a part of 12 Sea Cadets from six provinces, they sailed aboard the big cruiser late in January, and returned to Halifax, their embarkation port, late in April. During the voyage they were given regular ship's company duties, but special arrangements were made to take them on educational tours of the seaport cities, in the countries they visited.

Trades Training

Seven week trades training courses for Sea Cadets will be held at naval training establishments on both sea-coasts, and also at Hamilton, Great Lakes Training Center, this summer.

Courses will include Physical and Recreational Training; Bandsman; Leadership; Communications; Engineering Mechanic; Naval Aviation; Quartermaster and Minesweeping. There will also be a G course.

Sea Cadets taking these courses must be 16 years of age; have undertaken a two-week training period in a Sea Cadet establishment or cruise in an R.C.N. ship; be qualified in rank of Leading Cadet, and be physically and mentally capable of undertaking the training to be given.

Sea Cadets successfully completing the courses will be paid a bonus of One Hundred Dollars.
