Men of the local Hydro gand gave their services in putting in the cedar poles, which were donated by the Hydro. and with these in place, Mr. Moir and his two carpenters framed the building.

The Kinsmens Club as a whole turned out nightly to assist in the erection of the trusses, and the Sea Cadet Committee then proceeded to sheet in the building and roof it.

The lumber was supplied ~~at~~ absolutely cost price by the Davis Lumber Co., and this firm, along with other lumber companies donated different accessories for the building, such as windows, window frames, doors and door frames, while the Johns-Manville Co. & Ed. Christenson the roofer did the roofing job free of charge. All the hardware in the building was given by Yale & Towne Ltd while the electrical work was done free by George Steinhof the electrician and his men.

There was still the painting to be done and in this Mr. Henry Colton the Painter co-operated to the fullest extent, while the paint for the priming was donated by The Mercury Varnish Co, Scarfe & Co Ltd and the Imperial Oil Co. Ltd.
