### Cadet Units Unlikely To Follow Tri-Service Pattern Of Integration

Lt.-Cmdr. Richard Ratcliffe told The Standard after his inspection of RCSCC Renown last night that he doubted whether the ministry of defence would integrate army, navy and air force cadet units like the military forces.

He said they were operating very smoothly and he could see no reason for a merger.

However, he said he welcomed the reorganization of the armed forces. "Nothing but good can come of it for everyone," he said.

The commander added: "Take me, for instance. Although I am in the navy, I can now be employed under conditions in the air force or the army. In fact, I'm studying at the Air Force Staff College at Armour Heights in Toronto.
